Geographical Evolution A curious account of the growth of island is to be found in the report of the Commissioners of Woods and Forests, just issued. In the mouth of the Humber, it appears, there was in the time of Charles I. a small agglomeration of alluvial known as Sunk Island, and which in the reign of that King was granted on lease at a nominal rent, in consideration of the lessee incurring the risk of reclaiming and embanking it. What the extent of the land thus won from the estuary was is not stated. but about 130 years ago Sunk Island comprised 1,550 acres of cultivated land, with a small colony of farm servants and chapel upon it. At the beginning of the present century the island came into possession of the Crown, which granted new leases on condition that at least 2,700 acres of the alluvial deposits that had accumulated round the original embankments should be reclaimed, and the lessee not only added this extent of land to that which had been previously secured, but went far beyond his stipulated limit.
