A High School Master's Troubles.

Mr. Bristow, teacher at the Orilla High School, in 1876, left that place suddenly about Christmas, and in company with him a daughter of Mr. Shaw, a girl of eighteen years. At this time Bristow's real wife, to whom he had only been married eighteen months, was in Montreal visiting some friends. Where the guilty pair had been heard from last was at Detroit, Bristow having sent in his resignation to the Orilla School Board from that city. The sequel to the story comes from Cincinnati, in a telegram from that city, dated 26th October. It states that a Mr. L. Vaughan, Principal of the Scotts School, at Irvington, had met with a sudden domestic revelation. The officer accompanied Mr. Shaw and the lawyer to the house, where Miss Shaw met her father, and, after a few tears, consented to go with him to his home though she said she was not anxious to desert her companion. She left a note for Mr. Vaughan, saying she had gone to visit a sick friend in Cincinnati; and then hastily packing up, left the house with her father. The deputy-marshal locked the house and took the key to Vaughan, and explained the situation to him in full. Vaughan denied the story in toto, and asserted that this woman was his only wife. After school, he packed his valise and started in pursuit of his wife. While he was at his duties at school, this afternoon, Mr. William Shaw, of Campbellford, Ontario, accompanied by Mr. Selbert, an attorney of Cincinnati, called on deputy-marshal Woodson, of Irvington, and informed him that the woman in Mr. Vaughan's house, supposed to be Mrs. Vaughan, was Miss Shaw, his daughter, and that she had never been married to Vaughan at all. Bristow alias Vaughan, is a fine scholar, and readily found employment in Covington, where he is highly appreciated. He is a graduate of Cambridge University, England.

FEMALE BLACK-MAILERS.—One evening last week a wholesale merchant on Front-street, Toronto, was accosted by a respectable-looking female who asked him the way to Eliza street. Appearing a lady and of quiet demeanor, the gentleman offered to accompany her, the street lying on his road home. Arrived at the house, the girl pulled some letters out of her pocket, and, saying she could not read the addresses, asked the merchant to step into the house and read them for her. This he did, and the girl disarranged her hair and clothes and began shrieking. She brought several other girls and a man to her, and they surrounded the merchant, after seeing him threatened if he did not write a cheque for a large amount and give them all the money he had in his pockets they would give him into custody. He refused, however, and after a short struggle succeeded in breaking open the outer door and making his escape.

FATAL GUN ACCIDENT.—On Saturday afternoon a gun in the hands of a youth named Robert Somers accidentally exploded, and the contents entered the side of an eleven year old boy named James Hunter son of Mr. David Hunter of York Township. The shot passed completely through the body and came out on the opposite side. The boy lived for two hours after the accident in great suffering.

Thomas McWilliams was found dead on the Grand Trunk Railway track about a quarter of a mile west of the Brantford station, on Monday. The body was nearly cut in two. His watch, keys, and some letters were found in his pocket.

A sad accident occurred at the house of Mr. Oliver Goodfellow, near the central school, Galt, on Monday the 22nd ult., resulting in the death of his wife. Mr. Goodfellow left home in the morning and on returning at noon the dead body of Mrs. Goodfellow met his gaze. It appears that by some means she had fallen down cellar shortly after his departure, and when she was found shortly before noon her head was split open and she was insensible. She died shortly afterwards.

News respecting the fate of Sir John Franklin has been brought by one of the crew of the whaler lost in Hudson Bay in 1876, who states on the authority of the Esquimaux, that Sir John's vessel became a total wreck, and that the whole crew died. The Esquimaux also assert that a number of books—evidently journals and logbooks—were left by the white men, and buried at a point nine hundred miles inland, and to which none of the explorers have yet penetrated. There is some talk of fitting out an expedition in New York in the spring to secure records.

The *Tevotdale*, an iron ship bound from Cardiff to India with a cargo of coals, was abandoned on fire on the 1st of November, 1876, in latitude 11 degrees south, longitude 70 degrees east, near the Mauritius, the crew having been picked up soon after leaving the vessel. On the night of the 17th September, 1877, the mail steamer *Hindostan*, on her way from China to Suez, came across the abandoned *Tevotdale* two days before reaching and found the coal still smouldering in her hold. The fire had thus lasted ten months, and she had drifted about two thousand miles in that time.
