**The shower of Fish in Har-
wich**
A confirmation of the strange report that
shower of fish had fallen on the fourth
division of Harwich township is given
in a school teacher of the neighborhood
in a letter to the London Free Press
as to what he saw as follows:—
"Having dismissed the children for the
day, I was returning to my boarding place
with a side glass, I discovered
something in the grass. At first I thought
it was some species of rattlesnake, but
on a more careful scrutiny, I found it
was a fine, firm, fresh fish of the pickerel
species. Having been brought up at the
school I knew at once the fish was good
and picked it up while wondering whence
it came. My admiration was increased
when, stepping on a few yards
further, I found another equally good,
a few steps further and one more and then
I thought I ought to return to the school
for some paper in which to wrap
them. On entering the room I seized (rather
thoughtlessly you will say) one of the pairs
and proceeded to collect fish. When I had
more than half filled the pail, I saw a man
in the distance carrying some fish, and
supposing the mystery about to be solved
I awaited his approach. I dropped the
fish and felt somewhat guilty for having
appropriated the fish till, relieved by his
bearing me that he had gathered up also
one in the same way, and that he had
been seen pulling the largest of them.
He observed, these are as good as
fish as money could buy. I filled the
pail not only to the brim but up the whole
height of the handle, and having deposited
my burden, naturally in the form house
where I board, I returned to collect the re-
mainer. When I had finished my task,
I saw you that I felt ashamed. The
pail had occupied half an hour. This
fish extended about three quarters
of a mile. On the same evening one of
the pupils was sent for the cows to a field
about half a mile from my boarding place.
The cows returned laden with fish the
head of one in a similar way. This con-
firmed that the fish fell from behind her
which she could not conveniently carry to
the house. The lady, with her hands,
expressed the fish the same evening
feeding and smoking, and they were enjoy-
ing it this present day. The circum-
stances you will admit is unique, apart
from its strange surroundings, and I can-
not but think that the correspondent of the
London News did not overstate in report-
ing it. As to whether there were more fishes
fall six feet or six thousand, I know
not. One thing I am certain of, I know
that for a distance of about three
quarters of a mile, and that, at least to my
knowledge three persons gathered them."

**The British Premier on the
War.**
Right Hon. Thos. S. O'Brien, Alderman
for Bishopsgate, who was elected Lord
Mayor last September, was inaugurated
to-day with unusual ceremonies.
The new Lord Mayor gave the customary
banquet to-night at the Guildhall. A
distinguished company assembled, among
them the members of the Cabinet, the di-
plomatic corps, and members of Parlia-
ment. Earl Beaconsfield attended and
spoke. He declared that the Government
adhered to its declaration that British neu-
trality must cease if British interests were
assailed, or menaced. He believed the
policy of remaining neutral except in the
case of England's interests was the best
policy both for England and Turkey, as it
enabled Turkey to display vigor which de-
monstrated her right to be recognized
among the Sovereign Powers. With re-
gard to peace he did not take depending
views. He was encouraged by the remem-
brance that the Car solemnly declared
that his only aim was the amelioration of
the condition of the Christians, while the
Sultan repeatedly expressed his readiness
with respect to the war, and I trust
the time is not far distant when, with
the rest of the Powers, we may contribute to
a settlement of difficulties which may secure
the peace and independence of Europe."
