While no words can be too strong to condemn the disgraceful conduct of some 25 in the interest of the whiskey business, we are sorry to see, on the other hand, some of those charged with the adminstration of the law, and who should be careful not to bring it into disrepute, acting in a manner which, to say the least, is not calculated to impress unprejudiced people in their favor. 25 Information having been sworn to before 25 one of the magistrates of East Grey that Detective Benner had committed perjury in connection with one of the liquor cases 25 tried there, a warrant was issued for his 25 arrest, and a constable despatched to execute it. One would think that those who are avowedly working in the interests of law and morality would give every facility 20 for the investigation of a serious charge like this-if they had confidence in the innocence of the Detective they could easily bail him; or at all events they could be 20 certain that no harm would happen to him. and it would be a serious matter for his accuser, if the charge proved to be groundless. But instead of taking this straightforward course, Inspector Pearce goes off 20 to the Police Magistrate, and although Benner is living at his house, and evidently acting in concert with him in all these cases, swears to an information that he 20 does not believe he will appear as a witness unless compelled to do so, and gets a warrant to arrest him on that ground, on the 16 strength of which prior arrest he resists the 10 arrest for perjury! We know nothing of the merits of the case against Benner, they will be determined in due course; but this we are certain of, that when those who are 10 charged with carrying out the liquor laws, 10 and consequently are associated in the public mind with the temperance movement, instead of facilitating the adminis-10 tration of justice, resort to sharp practice and disreputable dodges apparently to prevent the arrest of a man accused of a serious crime, the spectacle is one which 10 cannot fail to damage any movement they are connected with, and we are sure cannot be approved by reasonable temperance men throughout the county.
