The Little Saskatchewan.
(From the Winnipeg Free Press.)
John McAvish, of section 5, in township 16, range 18 west, on the Little Saskatchewan river, exhibited at Mr. Burrows' office yesterday a magnificent sample of fine wheat, the product of the first ploughing. The grain was bright, large, and plump, and turned out 66 lbs. to the bush. The yield was 25 bushels to the acre. Mr. McAvish reports that over a hundred first-class settlers have located during the past season in and the neighboring townships, besides settling eastward north to the slopes of the Riding Mountain, and west to near Fort Rink. The country that he has explored, over one hundred miles along the base of the Riding Mountain, is very rich and attractive for settlement, having an abundance of wood and spring water, supplying soil of surpassing richness and fertility.

Miscellaneous.
Three thousand Spanish troops have been defeated by the Cuban insurgents near Holguin.
The British Isles were visited on Saturday night by a severe gale which occasioned much loss of life and property.
A conspiracy against the President of Guatemala has been discovered, and seven of the conspirators have been shot.
The locked-out iron workers on the Clyde are returning work on the shipbuilders and undertaking to reconsider the question of wages six months hence.
Six of the great Chinese companies in San Francisco have appealed to Washington for protection against violence, and the clearance of treaty obligations.
The Duke of Norfolk was married to Lady Flora Hastings at the Brighton Oratory on Wednesday, the service, which was one of unusual ceremony, being performed by three Bishops.
The new French Ministry met the Senate and Chamber of Deputies on Saturday, and in the latter House immediately sustained a defeat, Jules Ferry moving a direct vote of confidence in motion, which was adopted by 223 against 208.
A British man-of-war will in future be detached from the Pacific squadron to represent British interests near the Sandwich Islands. This step is taken in consequence of the acquisition by the United States of a naval station at the islands.
It is feared that 2700 men will be thrown out of work owing to the damage done by a recent gale to the new docks at Liverpool. An excavation of forty-two acres has been flooded, and work is likely to be resumed for six weeks.
The United States war vessel Hagan, four guns, bound for West Indian cruise, was ashore on Saturday when a few hours out from Fort Monroe. She subsequently went to pieces, and several bodies have been washed ashore. Thirteen officers and ninety-one men were drowned.
Extensive floods are reported in Virginia—Richmond and Lynchburg having especially suffered. The Shenandoah, Potomac, Jackson, Rappahannock, and Dan rivers have almost reached the point of the great flood of 1870, and are still rising. Railroad tracks, telegraph lines, bridge trestling, houses and villages have been swept away, and the loss of property is reported to be very great.
The damage by the floods in Virginia is said to be unprecedented in the inundated districts. Along the James River hundreds of persons have lost from \$10 to \$50,000 worth of property, and many from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000. In the neighborhood of Buchanan twenty colored persons were drowned, and much destruction prevailed.
