

Prosbytery of Sauguen.

This Prosbytery met in St. Andrew's church, Mount Forest, on Tuesday, Dec. 18th, at 2 o'clock p. m. and continued its sitting till Wednesday evening. The following are some of the most important items of business transacted:

A call from the congregation at Windsor Prosbytery of Quebec, to the Rev. W. Matheson of North Arthur, was considered and the translation of Mr. Matheson agreed to. Rev. Mr. Macmillan was appointed to preach the North Arthur congregation vacant, and Mr. Morrison to act as Moderator pro tem. of the Kirk Session. A call was also considered from Orangeville to Rev. Mr. McIntyre, of Knox Church, Harrison. This translation was also agreed to and Rev. Mr. Stewart, of Arthur, appointed to preach Knox church vacant, and Rev. D. Fraser to act as Moderator pro tem. of the Kirk Session. The resignation of the Rev. Mr. Gunn, of Hanover, laid on the table at a previous meeting of Prosbytery was accepted, and Mr. Gunn freed of his charge, Rev. Mr. Moffat was appointed to preach the church vacant and Rev. Mr. Duff to act as Moderator pro tem. of the session. A similar resignation of Rev. Mr. Harkness, of Maxwell and Peversham, Oprey, was disposed of in like manner. Mr. Harkness relieved from his charge, and Rev. Mr. Park appointed to preach the church vacant and act as Moderator pro tem. of the Kirk Session. The vacancy of all those congregations will occur early in January next.

Mr. Gunn reported that the deputation appointed to visit Eugene and Potts Corners had done so, and that they found in the vicinity of Potts Corners about 20 families of Scotch Highlanders destitute of the means of Grace, and that Eugene also needed to be specially looked after. The Prosbytery agreed to send Messrs. Fraser and Macmillan to the field at their own convenience and give them commission to confer with all the neighboring stations and make such arrangements as they best can for the prosperity of the cause and the good of the people there.

Mr. Cameron of Palmerston, also reported that he and Mr. Stuart visited as instructed, Waldemar and Little Toronto and were successful in effecting a union between these two, and that there was now the prospect of an early settlement of a pastor, harmony and success.

The claims of Knox College and the Theological Department of Queen's College were brought before the court by a resolution of Mr. Macmillan, sustained by Mr. Fraser. The resolution was agreed to and Messrs. Macmillan and Fraser appointed a committee to draw up a presbyterial circular, and do all they can to make the contributions of this Prosbytery this year as liberal as possible with the view of supporting the Ordinary Fund of the colleges and to remove the debt due on previous years. On Intimation by the clerk, Mr. Park, that the Foreign Mission Committee had appointed a deputation consisting of the Rev. Mr. McDonald, of Elora, Rev. Mr. Cameron, of Chatsworth, and Mr. Thomas McCrea of Guelph, to visit the Prosbytery in the interests of the Foreign Mission specially and asking the Prosbytery to make such arrangement as might be deemed best to give the deputation a hearing. The Prosbytery resolved to hold a series of missionary meetings throughout the whole Prosbytery, and appointed Messrs. Fraser, Crozier and Morrison, a committee to make all necessary arrangements for them, and that the arrangement be such, that due regard to the addresses to the people be paid to the schemes of the church but especially to the Foreign Mission, the college and the Home Mission.

On application a deputation was granted to visit Normandy and meet at Ayton with all parties concerned. The prayer of a petition from Dundalk was also granted giving them the privilege of taking steps with the view of having an ordained missionary settled there for two years.

Mr. John Martin Sr. of Mount Forest, on a citation of Prosbytery appeared and delivering up a registered copy of Knox Church deed in his possession. After some discussion it was agreed to postpone the case until there would be a larger attendance, and it was further agreed to cite Mr. Martin to appear at the next Prosbytery.

The Prosbytery closed to meet again in Durham, on the second Tuesday of March next, at 5 p. m.—*Examiner.*

An Inquest.

In pursuance of an information laid, an inquest was held by Dr. Eroyod, Coroner, Mount Forest, at the Presbyterian Church, 10th concession, Proton, on Saturday last for the purpose of enquiring into the cause of the death of Mrs. Janet Menzies, of Proton, who died on the 30th November by alleged "maltreatment or culpable negligence on the part of her medical attendant." The body was exhumed by order of the Coroner and the jury was duly empanelled, Mr. Thomas Rogers, of Colarville being chosen foreman. A post mortem was performed by Dr. McWilliam, of Dundalk, and Dr. Tanner, of Egremont. The result of the examination went to show that deceased died from inflammation of the Peritonaeum, after child labor, and the description of the symptoms given in the evidence of those who were in attendance upon the deceased during her illness apparently corroborated the post mortem appearances. James Menzies, the husband, stated in evidence, that he came to Mount Forest, and earnestly requested the medical attendant, Dr. Cotton, to pay her a second visit on the day following his first call. Also that on the morning of her death the Doctor was again called, but delayed answering the summons, and that his wife died before he could have reached the residence. Dr. Cotton in his evidence denied that he was requested to attend on the second day specified, but was merely asked to send an instrument to be used as directed; and that on the morning of her death he started to attend upon her as soon after the call as practicable. And,

furthermore, in his attendance upon deceased he had used no cutting instrument whatever. He considered the labor but an ordinary one, requiring no further medical attendance unless specially called for. Evidence was also given by Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Castello, sister in law of deceased, who acted as messenger. The coroner summed up the evidence at the close, and after some deliberation the jury returned the following verdict: "From the evidence given we are unanimously of the opinion that Janet Menzies came to her death by natural causes—namely puerperal peritonitis during child bed, but we cannot but censure the Doctor, James H. Cotton, for not going to see her when called for.—*Mount Forest Examiner.*

Miscellaneous.

Ten persons were killed on Thursday by the fall of the gable of Milne's Hotel, Edinburgh, Scotland.

Two shocks of earthquake were felt at Beachburg, on the line of the Canada Central, on Tuesday.

There have been 181 suicides in New York since January 1st, 1877, where coroners have held inquests.

The expense to Pennsylvania of the July riots reaches the neighborhood of half a million dollars. Two lines of Railway are charging the State for the transport of troops despatched for the protection of the property of these roads.

The Toronto by-law granting \$300,000 to the Toronto and Ottawa Railway was defeated on Thursday by a majority of 1,797. In consequence of the defeat the Ottawa and Carleton Councils have been requested by the President of the Company to withdraw the by-laws which were to have been submitted to those municipalities.

There has been a serious strike amongst the men employed on the Government works of the Lachine Canal; the men claimed \$1 per day of nine hours, instead of 90 cents. They have resorted to violence, and one of the ringleaders has been fatally wounded. At latest accounts the excitement had subsided, and the men were returning to work on their own terms.
