

The Ontario Legislature.

The third session of the third Parliament of the Province of Ontario, which opens to-day with the Speech from the Throne, will, in all appearance, not differ very greatly in character from the two which have preceded it. No startling events have occurred during the year, and from the beginning to the end of it the Province has gone steadily forward on the road to increased prosperity. The harvest was more than usually abundant last year—so much so that the Lieutenant-Governor will in all probability make some allusion to the fact, and to the return of a more prosperous era as its direct consequence. One important indication of the change which is gradually taking place is the partial revival of the lumbering industry, as shown by the improvement of the home market for lumber and the high prices obtained for new timber limits sold by auction during the year.

As there has been no falling off in lumber operations, and as the abundant harvest has placed in the hands of many purchasers of Crown lands the means of clearing off areas it is quite probable that the revenue derived from public lands and timber will be reported quite as buoyant as was expected when the estimates were framed last year. The visit of the Lieutenant-Governor last summer to the district in process of settlement east of Georgian Bay, no doubt he alluded to in the Speech. That visit had the effect of calling attention more particularly to the district in question, the colonization roads which either traverse it or are under construction, and the class of settlers who are pouring into it with great rapidity from the older parts of the Province, their place being, to some extent, supplied by the influx of tenant farmers and farm labourers from England, who find in this excellent opportunity for investing their capital and abundance of remunerative employment.

One of the most important measures of last session was the amended School Act, and it is highly probable that some reference will be made in the Speech to the radical changes which have taken place in the Public School system under its authority. The most important of these is the adoption of a very complete and at the same time economical method of supplying the province with trained teachers by means of County Model Schools, which have proved so successful in its operation that some specific allusion will no doubt be made to them, as well as to the system for the blind, the deaf, the dumb, and insane, all of which have, by means of additional and improvements been rendered much more serviceable than they formerly were for the purpose they were intended to serve.

The unusual activity manifested in various ways during the year by the promoters of the temperance movement can hardly fail to be noticed in a speech addressed to the Legislature which has ever shown the most readiness to make such improvement in the laws regulating the liquor traffic as experience seemed to call for, and in connection with the public health the improved method of collecting vital statistics and the success attending its operation deserve and will probably receive more than a passing notice.

The unusually large drain on the capital of the province, by the way of payments to completed Railways under Railway Aid Acts, affords an opportunity for sounding a note of warning which will doubtless be taken advantage of, the more so as the ordinary demands on the revenue are annually increasing with the extension of the area of settlement. The arbitration between this Province and Quebec being still unsettled, some reference will probably be made to it, as well as to another long pending question—that of the northern and western boundary of Ontario.

Since the close of last session the work of consolidating the statutes of the Province has been completed, and the Assembly will no doubt be congratulated on the fact that the legislation of last year has been embodied in the code which will, as a matter of course, be submitted for confirmation.

Miscellaneous.

The Siamese are preparing for war with China. Cholera has made its appearance at Jeddah and Mecca. Fearful atrocities have been committed by the Chinese in Kaolgar.

The Peruvian Government has made a contract with a shipping firm to supply, at least, fourteen thousand Chinese immigrants per year for five years. Two hundred lodges of frenzied Indians from Spotted Tail and Red Cloud's bands who broke away from the main body during their transfer to their new reservations, joined Sitting Bull.

Several outbreaks occurred at London on Friday night on the receipt of the news of the release of some of the Fenian prisoners, and the mob broke the windows of the parish church.

Trouble is brewing between Spain and Hayti over the former's execution of a Spanish subject at Port-au-Prince. Should the execution take place the Spanish admiral would bombard the city.

A letter from Greenville, Ala. tells of the existence of a Mormon settlement in Butler county, in that State, within fifteen miles of Greenville, under a self-proclaimed saint named Vicary, who says he is inspired.

Stanley has had a reception from the Khedivial Geographical Society of Alexandria, from which place he departed en route for Rome. The Geographical Society of Paris is preparing a grand reception in his honor.

Of nearly 90,000 Satsuma rebels recently tried at Nagasaki, Japan, some three hundred were acquitted and some 36,000 pardoned. Twenty were fined, 117 deprived of rank, about 1,900 condemned to imprisonment, and twenty ordered to be decapitated.

The Hudson's Bay Company report the past year as very dull and unprofitable in the fur line. Buffalo robes have gone down in price fifty per cent since 1872, and the trade in mink, martens, beaver and muskrat skins for 1876 represented a falling off in receipts of \$540,000.

The Asiatic cholera epidemic in Japan has now entirely disappeared. During two months eleven hundred persons perished in the Nagasaki district about the same number in Ochi and Kishi, and about a thousand in Yokohama and vicinity, where the disease first made its appearance in September.

The New York Civic Committee of Investigation into the Ring frauds reports that about thirty million dollars were stolen and a little under \$900,000 recovered. The Committee recommend the prosecution of the Ring thieves who have not already done so, and ensure the lawyers employed to conduct the prosecutions for bungling and indecision. They recommend the liberation of Tweed as less expensive than his further incarceration.
