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The Empire of Japan is made up of 8,800 islands. A copper lead has been discovered at Watford. Hon. The Governor-General returned to Ottawa on Tuesday week, accompanied by one of President Hayes' sons. Never spend your money before you have it. A Western paper accuses a contemporary of 'city meanness,' and remarks 'We want him to understand that two men play at that game.' An asylum for women and children at Tien-Tsin, China, has been burned, and over two thousand persons are reported to have perished in the flames. A mother seeing her little four-year-old nearly asleep in her chair, asked if she had not better go to bed. Oh, no, mamma; 'I only shut my eyes to keep the dust out.' The discovery of two planets—the one of the twelfth magnitude at Toulouse, France, on the 29th ult., and the other, of the tenth magnitude, at Clinton, N. Y., on the 4th inst.—is announced. The tax-payers of North Waterloo are agitating for railway extension through that district, either by means of a line from Salem through to Stratford, or from Waterloo to Strathroy, via Elmira, to Mount Forest, to strike a point on the Georgian Bay. The Convener of the Glasgow Presbytery has telegraphed to the Pope, relative to the proposed restoration of the Scottish hierarchy, that an interdict will be demanded from the Supreme Civil Court of Scotland, and that the laws of the country will be rigidly enforced. A lad arrested for theft, when taken before the magistrate and asked what his occupation was, frankly answered, 'Stealing.' 'Your candor astounds me!' said the judge. 'I thought it would' replied the lad, 'seeing how many big 'uns there are in the same business and is ashamed to own it!' In the woods near Coldwater on Monday morning H. Coleman, employed by W. H. Tanner, lumberman, was with his son working on a very large skidway when the logs gave way, many of them passing over him. The son, who escaped unhurt, ran for help, and had his father removed in a few minutes, but he died before the arrival of the Orillia doctor, who was at once telegraphed for. Household Receipts. A despatch from Winnipeg to the Public Works Department states that the track is laid and the engine is running fifty-five miles west of that place. Track-laying is going on at the rate of one mile a day, and it is expected that by next month eighty miles will have been put down. Sifton, Ward, & Co. have removed their headquarters from Selkirk to Winnipeg, now that the railway between the two places is in operation. The report of Mr. Hughes, who was appointed to investigate the frauds in the teachers' examinations, shows that 41 candidates obtained the papers previous to the examinations, through an employer in the office of Hunter, Rose & Co. The Minister of Education has declared the certificates of these teachers null and void, but they are permitted to present themselves again for examination in July next. The exposure and disgrace attending this investigation is a pretty severe punishment upon the guilty parties, and we think that there is little danger of any one again resorting to such dishonorable means to secure certificates. Mr. Alfred Wright, who was wounded in the Koo-Wright shooting affray last summer, is back again at Coramanda, and looks about as well as ever, barring a little lameness. Mr. Wright had a very narrow escape for his life, and has recovered much quicker than anyone expected. The Indian is still at large, and seems likely to remain so, so far as any efforts to take him are concerned. The right way to do it would be to offer a reward—say \$50—for his capture. There are plenty of men who could be found for the job under those circumstances. It is scandalous to think that no less than three expeditions have been sent out to take him, and they have all failed. A demonstration, in which some six thousand people took part, was held at Quebec on Tuesday last, to manifest the public disapproval of the Local Government's railway policy. An immense procession was formed, and with a series and transparently paraded the city, and halted before the Parliament Buildings, where the processionists burnt the Attorney-General in effigy. The proceedings caused a slight scare inside the buildings, and the Government police were stationed at the doors to prevent the ingress of intruders. One or two windows were broken, and the crowd then resumed their parade. A hundred men of 'B' Battery and some mounted Hussars were called out to preserve order, but their services were not required. A distinguished politician from the rural districts resolved to give a 'jeu de l'argent' dinner to some of his party friends. In order to make sure that everything should be of the best quality, he went to market himself, and bought first a turtle. After taking great pains to select one of the finest specimens in the lot, and ordering it to be sent home, he said to the tradesman, by way of making it quite right: 'This is a real genuine turtle ain't it?' 'Oh! certainly,' was the reply. 'One of the very best.' 'Because,' added the politician, 'although I ain't been in the city long, I ain't to be humbugged. It won't do for you to try to put off any of your stock turtles on me.'
