

before I close as all the more improper, though to common. At that time in your Durham Town Hall, I gave, among other things, an eminent Baptist authority for it, namely Dr. Cramp, Professor (now President) of Acadia (Baptist) College, Nova Scotia; whose "Baptist History," (London, 1875), is now before me. Its "Introductory Notice" or Preface is by Dr. Angus, President of Regent's Park Baptist College, London, Eng., who after commending Dr. Cramp's "condemning intelligence" &c., says, "these qualities will be found to characterize his volume. The reader will find a fuller and more satisfactory account in these pages than anywhere besides. To such an authority, at least Baptist readers may be expected to attach much weight, and the more especially as it could not be difficult for him to know all about the 'American Bible Union' and the 'Bible Translation Society.'"

At my meetings in Durham referred to, read from that work, (pages 478-4) being carefully overlooked as I read, by Mr. Brown, Baptist, and Mr. Hunter, M. P. P., Presbyterian, beside me, as follows:—"There are some departments in which the Baptists must be content to tamour, and among our own benevolent institutions are the following:—English Baptist Home Missionary Society, Baptist Irish Society, Baptist Highland Mission, Society for Aged or Infirm Baptists, Baptist Building Fund, American Baptist Publication Society, American and Foreign Bible Society, Bible Translation Society, Southern Baptist Convention, American Bible Union, American Baptist Historical Society. Then follows five of the "Foreign Mission Societies," which with these now given are quite well, to be Baptist institutions. And among them your readers see (as pointed by me) the "American Bible Union," in question, and "Bible Translation Society." I have quoted the above in full that it may be seen also by the non-Baptists how Baptist they are. There were nothing more than this in the "Rev. Mr. Bethune" and "Argus," the fact that the New Testament, referred to, has translated baptisms, everywhere they occur by "baptize" and its cognates, and "A" that on his own admission saw all this so related, surely he was very wrong when what he has done of the former, in a sense of honour should lead himself to what he said—that "Argus must know what he said to have been said." And now I am fully justified, I think, in asking him if he will affirm of Dr. Cramp, that his statement is a "false impugning" a "fool stander on his lips" which he "gives him a crimson cheek?" Dr. Cramp being a Baptist and a Baptist College Professor and President will I think make a suitable ref. he says so of him.

My add that I read out the same of from the copy of his "Baptist History" (same edition and page as my copy) the Rev. Mr. Stewart, Baptist in Durham, had on the Town Hall on one of our recent meetings there, by getting a personal Baptist near, if I have quoted, and will find I have.

Even the American Bible Union's explanation of the subject, which I have on hand, is after all, not contrary to what I have affirmed, which I can show to be easily. But at present, Mr. Cramp, I will have occupied all the space in my paper for one issue; and I would not if the foregoing is not convincing to you, or any other reader to know that if I can spare the time I will, if necessary, add more light; but "seems enough." Hunter, assessed for Lot 15, Mill Street N., Markdale, instead of Edward Blackstock; Holt, Davis, instead of Thomas E. Davis, for Lot 6, Mill St. N., Markdale; William Davidson as owner of Lot 65, Con. 2, E. G. R., instead of George Dinkly; Thomas Brennan, struck off the Roll; Frank Foster assessment raised \$50; Arch. McLellan, Lot 22, Con. 4, N. D. R., name struck off.

Campbell and others applied for a grant for a bridge at Lot 17, Cons. 2, and 3, E. G. R.

Moved by Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that the petition of Isaac Hooper and others be granted.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, seconded by Mr. Davis, that the petition of John McQuarrie and others, to build a bridge at Lot 48, between the 2nd and 3rd Cons., N. D. R., be granted; also \$80 for said purpose, and that the mover let and inspect the work.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Donnelly, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that Messrs. Davis and Dunsmore be appointed a Committee to let a contract for building a bridge at Lots 5 and 6, between Cons. 8 and 9, the amount not to exceed \$500.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dunsmore, seconded by Mr. Davis, that \$25 be granted for a bridge at Lot 17, Con. 2, E. G. R., and that the mover let the work.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Dunsmore, that the account of G. J. Blyth, for printing, amounting to \$17, be paid.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Donnelly, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that Joseph Morrow be refunded \$1 for statute law charged to him in 1877, which he had performed.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, seconded by Mr. Donnelly, that Mrs. Seaton and Mrs. Risk receive each \$4 as charity.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Dunsmore, that \$30 be granted for bridge at Lot 58, Con. 2, E. G. R., the work to be let by the mover.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Dunsmore, that \$70 be appropriated to each Ward for the improvement of roads and bridges, and that no further special grants be made, except to town-lines.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Donnelly, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that John S. Black be paid \$78 for assessing, and \$5 for distributing notices of appointments to office.—Carried.

By-law No. 170, to divide the township into five polling subdivisions read three times, and passed.

D. McDonald, Esq., and the Clerk, having been appointed some time ago to prepare certain by-laws for the township, submitted drafts of by-laws with the following recommendation, which was adopted:—

To the Reeve and Council of the Township of Glenelg:—

In addition to the by-laws prepared by us, we would respectfully recommend the printing of the Act respecting fences, with the amendment of last Session, and also of the Act respecting ponds.

Applications of Police trustees of the Police Villages of Flesherton and Markdale, presented and read. Communications from the following parties presented and read: G. L. Latimer, C. Gamon, F. McCann, J. C. Griffiths. Petitions presented and read as follows: Thos. Elliott and others, G. J. Blyth and others, A. Munshah and others. Accounts presented as follows:—Thos. Lauder, Registration, &c., \$17.15; A. McGill, road scrapers, \$78; T. Bolster, Stationery, \$5.87; M. E. Merriam, Mr. Boyle's Coffin, \$9; J. W. Henderson, quarter's salary, \$37.50; J. Montgomery, bread to Mr. Boyle, \$1.70; G. J. Blyth, printing, \$32.50. Mr. Webster moved, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that the following accounts be paid: G. J. Blyth, J. Montgomery, Thos. Lauder, M. E. Merriam, J. W. Henderson, T. Bolster, and that the Reeve issue his order for the same.—Carried. Mr. Pedlar moved, seconded by Mr. Webster, that the Reeve issue his order in favor of Mr. Whitly for \$77, being salary and postage as assessor for 1878.—Carried. Mr. Pedlar moved, seconded by Mr. Wright, that the Collector be asked to give some definite information relative to lot 37, con. 14, as to whether it were possible to collect the taxes from the property thereon for years 1874, 1875 and 1877.—Carried. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Webster, that in reference to the matter of F. McCann, that the Clerk be instructed to say that if receipt is produced to the Council that taxes have been paid as stated, that the Council will see taxes properly returned.—Carried. Mr. Pedlar moved, seconded by Mr. Webster, that a correspondence be entered into between parties owning land through which a proposed road is to run from the Artemesia falls to the Town line of Euphrasia, and with Council of Euphrasia as to parties in the route of said road in Euphrasia, their proposition to be based on the fact of the road being established throughout, and that with this view the report of Councilor Wright be received, as well as the rough sketch of said road by G. L. Latimer, both of which to be properly filed.—Carried. Mr. Wright moved, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that the matter of Peter Scott not be entertained, as those lots are usually considered in assessing to contain fifty acres, more or less.—Carried. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Webster, that the prayer of the petition of James Elliott and others, relative to opening Town line between Artemesia and Euphrasia, opposite lots 95 and 96, be granted, and that the Commissioner for Ward No. 2 be authorized to expend a sum not to exceed \$50, for the above purpose, providing the Township of Euphrasia expend an equal amount on said portion of road.—Carried. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Wright, that the Reeve issue his order for \$8, being expenses of Committee on Valley road.—Carried. Mr. Webster moved, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that \$12 be granted towards opening side road No. 30, S. D. R., provided Mr. Vance give an equal amount in work for Council for Ward No. 2, to inspect it. Council adjourned.
