> THE OLDEST AMERICAN LAND PLANT. -Relics of terrestial vegetation of extreme antiquity have been found in Ohio by Prof. called attention to a slab of fossiliferous limestone from the Clinton beds, which is notable for presenting vegetable impressions which are strikingly suggestive of a character of the plant Prof. Claypols has had the benefit of Dr. Dawson's advice. Probably it belongs to a new genus, closely related to Lepidodendron, for which the name "Glyptodendron" is suggested-a name which refers to the sculpturing of the stem. 
