remarked that any fool can make a joka of sacred things, and that mere coarseness is often looked upon as a form of wit. The man who has to distort Scripture, or say what is nasty, or revile his neighbour, in order to raise a laugh; may often succeed but at best his wit is of a second rate order. A close observation of things on the surface, a vivid appreciation of shades and character as they are presented to the eye, will alone constitute a fund of pure comedy, and it is in this particular that Dickens liffers from the greatest humourist of his day. Thackeray was superior to Dickens because he saw below the surface, and though he never created a Weller, or even a Tapley; the outpourings of his own mind are always sufficient to secure for him the higher place.
