The Electric Light.

From the London World. The state of expectation in which public mind allows itself to be held wit reference to the so-called "divisibility" of the electric light by Mr. Edison is some what surprising, seeing that all the time this divisibility is a fait acompli in England and may be witnessed and tested an night of the week at the Times printing office. Armed with an order for this purpose I went there the other evening, and this is what I saw :- From gas light we merged suddenly into what seemed a flood of daylight, which came from six small lamps placed at intervals round a large

room, in which compositors and others were busy at work. These lamps were suspended so as to be raised and lowered at will.
