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CANADIAN ITEMS.
Woodstock has this year built to the amount of \$70,000.
A covered skating and curling rink is about being erected in Perth.
Hon. Louis Renand, who recently died, had his life insured for \$100,000.
It is proposed that the drill shed at Bradford be used as a skating rink.
Elora has erected new buildings during the present season at a cost of \$12,000.
A little over \$100,000 was expended in the erection of buildings in Guelph during 1878.
An infant child of John O'Grady, of Stratford, drank some concentrated fly and died.
Thos. Gault, of Listowel, has been fined \$20 and costs for carrying a pistol, contrary to law.
Ingersoll's building improvements during the past year are estimated at \$12,000.
Intelligence has been received from New California of a fresh massacre of colonists by the natives.
A young man named Josephus Dickson, fell off his horse in Exbridge on Monday and was killed.
The Manitoba elections will be held on Wednesday, the 18th of December, and the nominations on the 11th.
The Bishop of Toronto is in a feeble state of health as to necessitate his abstaining from all work.
Mantolines are preparing petitions to the Postmaster General for an increase in the number of winter mails.
The farmers of Fullarton are getting up a petition asking the Council of Mitchell to do away with the market fees.
Hon. M. C. Cameron on Wednesday was sworn in as a Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench by Chief Justice Hagarty.
On Friday last a man named D. McCallum, a laborer, was so severely injured by an engine on the Hamilton and North Western Railway, at Georgetown, that he died on Tuesday.
Rev. Joseph Griffith of Garafraux intends to accept the call tendered him by the Congregational Church of Hamilton, and is likely to begin his ministry in the latter place about the beginning of January.
The new section of the Mount Forest Central School was formally occupied on Wednesday last and the various departments have been re-arranged accordingly. The heating apparatus has been fully tested and works satisfactorily.
On Monday night of last week D. Matthews, of Huron township, was drowned in Kincardine harbour. He had been drinking, and is thought to have fallen into the water when trying to make his way to his brother's vessel, the *Caledonia*.
Whilst a funeral procession was moving down the Montreal road a few days ago, the horse attached to the hearse became frightened and ran away. The hearse was seized into a ditch, the coffin thrown out and broken, and the sacred contents deposited in the mud.
The line of the Stratford and Huron Railway Company is proposed to be constructed from Stratford to the northern extremity of the township of St. Edmund in the county of Bruce, through the counties of Perth, Wellington, Grey, Bruce, and Huron, and to be constructed through the Great Manitoulin Island.
While Mr. Thomas Gray was preparing to go to hunt on the 21st Nov., at Cobourg, after getting into his canoe, one of his little girls, a child about eight years of age, went to the shore with a lunch, and to shove the canoe out, and while in the act of shoving the canoe, the gun, which was lying on the crisp pieces of the canoe, fell from over them and went off, the charge entering her breast, causing death within an hour.
There has come to light an extensive system of forgery perpetrated by a wagon-maker at Ivy. For some time past he sold, through an agent in Barrie, a number of notes apparently made by farmers in his neighborhood. On the discovery of the crime, Messrs. Lennox & Lennox got security for a number of the creditors, but one gentleman will lose about \$2,000. The culprit has fled, leaving his wife and two children behind.
On Saturday last, prior to the departure of the Quebec evening train, two sharpers induced an unsuspecting young man to give them \$25 in Canadian currency for what they represented was \$5 gold pieces of the Dominion. The bogus coin had on one side a representation of a female head, and on the other the figure of a female apparently in the act of throwing dice, with the inscription "Keep your temper." The young man soon discovered that the coins were gilded base metal.
A fanatic created quite a stir in Dundas for a day or two. He gave out that he had \$80,000 to spend in town—that he was going into business on an extensive scale. He rented, or pretended to have rented, stores and buildings right and left—brought men to come to work for him next day—engaged bookkeepers—bought one or two establishments—made contracts of various kinds—and next day he moved out, not to doubt to play the same role in some other place. He succeeded in humbugging quite a number of the citizens of the town, but no one lost anything by him.
A western exchange says:—Essex has a case of genuine leprosy. A few yards south of fish hatchery at Petite Cote is an old-fashioned open fire-place. It has no floor, and is only half-roofed. The road at that point runs along the beach, and the building stands between the wagon track and the river. In this miserable hole lives a woman about 40 years of age with two children, a boy and a girl, aged about ten and twelve years respectively. The mother of this isolated family is afflicted with that most terrible of all diseases—leprosy—and the three subsist on food which the children beg from the neighborhood, and the fire kept by drift-wood, &c., gathered from the shore.

The Electric Light.
From the London World.
The state of expectation in which the public mind allows itself to be held with reference to the so-called "divisibility" of the electric light by Mr. Edison is somewhat surprising, seeing that all the time this divisibility is a *fait accompli* in England and may be witnessed and tested any night of the week at the *Times* printing office. Armed with an order for this purpose I went there the other evening, and this is what I saw:—From gas light we merged suddenly into what seemed a flood of daylight, which came from six small lamps placed at intervals round a large room, in which compositors and others were busy at work. These lamps were suspended so as to be raised and lowered at will. In compliance with the wish of one of the gentlemen present one of these lights, selected at haphazard, was turned out without the slightest perceptible increase in the volume of light in the other lamps. Then another light at a distance was treated in a similar manner and with a like result. These two were then relit by a turn of the tap the reverse way and turned on full power. Then one was slightly "dimmed," so as to give about a third of its full light, with an ordinary gas. In short, we found there a useful and agreeable light, which can be moderated and arranged to suit all circumstances. This is the *lantern* light. I am no electrician, and shall not attempt to give a technical description of the apparatus employed, but it seemed to possess great simplicity. Mr. Balfour says he can burn ten lights in one circuit; that his carbons will burn for ten hours; that they can be easily renewed, and without extinguishing the lights. He further estimates its comparative cost with gas as less than a third.
AN ALLEGED SWINDLER.—A *Globe* correspondent writing from Hamilton, Wednesday last says:—To-day two men named Daniel Stewart and Geo. Stevens were charged before the Police Magistrate on a charge of swindling preferred by a young Arthur township farmer named Michael Tooney. It appears that prisoners arrived here on Sunday last, having in their possession a horse valued at about \$400, which a young man named John Mack belonging to Guelph, had in charge for them. The party were joined at the hotel shortly afterwards by complainant, who sold out his farm last year, and has been making money by dealing in lands ever since. The objects of this young man's visit was to find out how he was prospering with the horses, which they brought here when it was discovered that Tooney was here the boy Mack left for the other side with the horses, and cannot now be discovered. Tooney believed that the man intended to swindle him, and that his right existed more in name than otherwise. He therefore obtained a warrant for the arrest of Stewart and Stevens on a charge of defrauding him out of \$250. It is said that the prisoner Stewart has already been three years in the Penitentiary. The case was adjourned till to-morrow.
