## Amusing Speech by Professor

The winter session of the University of Eninburgh was opened lately with introductory addresses by the several professors. Among the first of the professors to meet with the stadents was Professor Blackie, who opened his junior Greek class in the morning. This being the Professor's first appearance before his classes since his return from Egypt, he was enthusia tically received on entering. The subject of Professor Blackie's address was " The comparative value of Greek, Latin, Sanscrit, and Hebrew, the latter of which he said was spoken of as exclusively a study for theologians, though he did not see why that should be, seeing they were all Christians, or pretended to be so, the learned Profess r said that some ignorant people, and there were plenty of these in Scotland, wondered what was the use of his going to Egypt; but three of the best books in the Greek language were about Egypt, and he intended to use them in his class this winter.
