> The San Francisco News-Letter says .-The coal mines of Seattle and Coos Bay are now furnishing us with increased supplies and at some advance upon summer prices. The coal mines of Vancouver Island are being rapidly developed, both at Napaimo and Departure Bay. The former is largely used for steamship purposes, quotable by the cargo at \$7, while the Wellington is largely used for household purposes, and when screened is sold to the tra le at \$9. The California Mount Diable coal mines continue free supplies of their steam coal at \$4.50 for fine screening, up to \$5 to \$5 50 for lump coal.
