A WHOLE FANTLY BUTCHERED AND BURNED.

The Victorio Colonist, May 7, says :-News of a mysterious affair, supposed to have taken place on or about the 22nd ult., has been received from Lillooet from the Indians. The residence of Mr. Thomas Pool, who has been living at the Pemberton Portage for some years, and was believed to have considerable money in his possession, has been discovred burnt to the ground, but still smoking. The smoke was noticed by an Indian en route to Lillooet, who proceeded to the spot, and on examining the debris found the dead body of Mr. Poole lying on a quantity of potatoes in the sellar. The remains were disfigured, the legs and arms being burned off and the head severely scorched. No trace was found of his two children, and up to the present time the whole is wrapped in mystery. It has not been ascertained whether the fire took place during the night or day, nor is it known whether deceased was kill. ed by Indians or came to his death accidentally. His house was situated in lonely spot, some 10 or 12 miles distant from any other white habitation. He was a strong, healthy man, and as the building was constructed of logs and well supplied with windows and doors it appears very strange that he did not affect his escape, more especially as the house being built of logs could not have burned very rapidly. The gentleman who supplies this information says there is no Justice of the Peace residing within five miles of Lillooet, and as the Coroner lives 50 miles away no offieial action has been taken in the matter up to the 26th ult. Mr. J. Woods, however, being a friend of the deceased, had pro- heart. exceed to the spot, at considerable personal expense and inconvenience, to endeavor to unravel the mystery.

The same prper contains the following despatch from Clinton:-"The coroner's inquest as to the cause of the death of the Pool family on Pemberton Portage has divulged the fact that a most foul murder has been committed. Upon examination it was found that Pool's throat had been cut and he had been shot through the heart. The girl, aged about eight also had her threat cut. The boy, about ten years old, was so badly barned as to render an examination impossible. Suspicion rests on a Douglas Indian known as Black Jim, and steps have been taken to arrest him. It is supposed there must have been others concerned in the murder. Pool's watch, gun, and money are missing. It is supposed that after the murder the bodies. were thrown into the house which was then fired to destroy all trace of the terrible deed."

The life of a little boy was destroyed in a few minutes by injecting an infusion tobacco in the bowels. Death has been produced in the same way in grown people In one instance the result was fatal immediately after the introduction of the tobacco enema. In another death followed in fifteen minutes; and in a third only threequarters of an hour elapsed. Such immediaetly fatal results are not frequent, to be sure, but they testify to the existence of a deadly poison in tobacco in a manner which leaves no room tor argument.

Amaurosis, or nervous blindness, which disease there is partial or complete loss of sight without any apparent change in the organization of the eye, has been charged to the excessive use of strong tobacco. It is believed by some of your best authorities that there are few persons who have smoked for any great length of time more than five drachms of tobacco a day, without having their vision, and frequently their memory, enfeebled. A case of impaired vision presents itself which resisted every manner of treatment until it was discovered that the patient was in the habit of smoking large quanties of strong tobacco. As soon as the pipe was abandoned the individual gradually recovered his sight.

Tobacco is a powerful sedative, and there is not a single individual addicted to its use who has not at some time been prostrated by an overdose.
