The special London (Eng.) correspondent of the Globe telegraphs that the Privy Council has resolved that there is no good reason for the dismissal of M. Letellier, the Governor of the Province of Quebec.

Professor Thompson, of Glasgow, a very distinguished scientist says that he has no doubt as to the success of the electric light, and thinks that for street illumination it should be placed at a height of 80 to 90 feet.

The International Park road Niagara Falls recommended by Lord Dufferin forms the subject of a paragraph in the Governor of New York's message to the Legislature in a very approving manner.

The negro exodus from the Southern States to the prairies of the West continues to go on. The Southern planters have resorted to every possible means to hinder it, even going so far as to make transport by vessels dangerous and thus steamboat companies refused to carry negroes.

In a report recently issued by Mr. C. J. Brydges it is stated that there are 6,143 miles of railway in operation, and 1,762 in course of construction. Of the total number 3,583 miles are furnished with steel rails.

The English Church Association of the Diocese of Toronto has been dissolved. It was instituted many years ago for the purpose of checking the spirit of ritualism and fostering the growth of Evangelical truth in that Diocese.

The Marquis de Lorne is now experiencing the effects of the discredit lately pursued by Sir John A. Macdonald in the course of the late session of the Dominion Parliament in the Letellier embroglio.
