THE ZULUS.

The tragical fate of the Prince Imperial of France, an account of which will be found in another column, gives a fresh interest to the war which is being carried on at the present time by the British troops against the Zulus of South Africa.

IMMENSE FORTUNE.—We learn from a correspondent in Nassagwaya, that quite a sensation prevails there, from the fact that the Allison family in that neighbourhood are about to enter proceedings to recover \$12,000,000, which has been lying in the Bank of England for about one hundred years, and which they claim belongs to them as direct heirs, through the deceased of a wealthy relative.

INCENDIARY FIRE.—About noon on Monday a man, apparently a tramp, was observed to come out of the barn of Mr. Wm. Reid, 16th con., Egremont, and make tracks for a swamp near by.

G. B. & W. RAILWAY.—Wednesday evening last a meeting of the Directors of the Georgian Bay and Wellington Railway Company was held in the Engineer's office, Mount Forest.

THE OWEN SOUND TRIBUNE SAYS:—A farmer with our market and heavy wagon drove on a street with his load—a lamb skin—for which he obtained the sum of 10c.

A violent earthquake on Tuesday near the town of Acta, Sicily, almost completely destroyed five villages.

DOMINION Day will be observed as a holiday in Durham. The Wellington brigade artillery is in camp near Guelph.

A fire in Markdale on Wednesday morning destroyed Wright's furniture shop, Bennett's grocery, and Mrs. Wright's dwelling. Loss about \$4,000.

A PROTEST will be held on Jas. Skene's farm on July 1st, in connection with Latona School and S. S. No. 13, Bentinck. A good time is expected.

FATALITY KILLED BY A HORSE.—Last Friday evening a young man named Robt. Walker, while leading a horse along the road near Mount Forest, was suddenly kicked on the chest by the animal.

THE OWEN SOUND TRIBUNE SAYS:—Since election day, in no less than three instances have members in Owen Sound been summarily dismissed from employment by Conservative employers because they refused to be driven to the polls to vote for the Conservative Candidate.

NEW SHERIFF.—It has been known for some time past that Mr. Maughan had sent in his resignation of the office of Sheriff, and on Saturday last Mr. C. H. Moore was gazetted to the vacant office.

REVENUE TARIFF.—Mr. Jas. Massie, Esq., has been appointed by the Ontario Government Registrar for the South Riding of Wellington.

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THE CENTRAL EXHIBITION takes place at Owen Sound on Wednesday and Thursday, the 24th and 25th of September.

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A BY-LAW to suspend the collection of harbour dues at Owen Sound has been carried by a large majority.

THE RECOUNT. The recount of ballots by the County Judge took place on Tuesday and Wednesday last week, resulting in a change of six, leaving Mr. Creighton's majority 18.

THE SOUTH AMERICAN WAR.—The recent naval engagement between the Chilean and Peruvian fleets near Iquique resulted in considerable loss.

FATAL SHOOTING AFFRAY.—A shooting affray took place near Mansfield last Friday evening, whereby a young man named Thomas Cook was fatally shot by an old man named Chester Monroe.

THE POPULATION OF EMERSON is now estimated at 1,099—an increase of about 700 since last fall.

As the notoriety of the Rev. David Macrae, of Greenock, Scotland, and his views on the subject of future punishment have at present culminated in his deposition from the ministry, so far as the U. P. Church is concerned, it may not be out of place to refer to his record as a student of years ago.

It is now certain that, if this Dominion had another chance to vote upon the question at issue in last Dominion general election, Sir John would be again hurried from power. Seeing this to be the case, I think it would be advisable for the Government to dismiss his Government, and give the power to those who are in accord with the implied wishes of the people.

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An accident of an unusually shocking character occurred in Mt. Forest Thursday morning, by which Mr. John Flett was instantly killed and Mr. James Brown suffered injuries which in all likelihood will result fatally.

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Archer, usually considered the "devil's place of peace, harmony, and charity" among the sexes of our country, was a poor but honest and industrious woman; and her husband, George Antickup—who is alleged to have committed the terrible crime of which his wife's brains out with an axe which was in the act of milking a cow—was an uneducated, desperate, and unfeeling man.

A jury was empanelled last night at the Town Hall, and the most important witnesses were called. The evidence taken, points directly to Antickup as guilty. It appears that he has threatened his wife frequently, and has attempted suicide on several occasions.

At daybreak yesterday (Wednesday) morning Antickup was heard going about and kneeling in prayer in the kitchen, after which he went to his house. Mrs. Antickup, the unfortunate woman, saw shortly afterwards and went out to milk a cow in a pasture field and six rods from the house.

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
