

I have also to state that owing to some irregularity or omitting to report on the part of a Special Committee appointed last year to supervise the construction of a Bridge on the County boundary line of Minto and Normanby, the matter was left uncompleted and unsettled for, and that upon the advice of the Ex-Warden and the County Solicitor, I ordered an inspection of the work to be made, and gave an order to the Warden of the County of Wellington same-upon the Committee's recommenda

It is my duty to refer to the matter of a Courts, and growing out of the vaguely-expressed wording of a Report and resolution of last year's Council-respecting the disposition of the Dunkin Act fines. Correspondence and explanation will be forthcoming and submitted to a proper committee In view of the large increase of business
