Cod and mackeral form the chief take in Nova Scotia, cod and herring in Quebec, herring lobster and salmon in New Brunswick, sal mon in British Columbia, lobster and mack eral in Prince Edward Island, and white fish in Ontario. The total export of fish in 1878 amounted to \$7,984,372, which was distributed to the United States, Great Britain and the West Indies, the chief market being the United States.
