Still further, when the matter was brought up in the Parliament of Canalfrom which M. Letellier recieved his apreintment, his action in dismissing t De Boucherville Cabinet was sustained. Surely this was enough. But no, the result of the elections on the 17th of September gave fresh courage to the discomfitted Tory faction. A motion was brought up once more in the House of Commons, dur the Conservative majority. Sir John, true to his policy of retention of office at all hazards, and unwilling to alienate the support of Messrs. Mousseau and Girouard recommended that M. Letellier be dismmissed-not, be it observed for any violation of the Constitution, but on the ground that "his usefulness was cone," while at the same time the Lieut. Governor's administration was sustained at the polls on two successive occasions. Such conduct on the part of Sir John Hacdonald and his Cabinet brings us back to the days of Strafford and Thomas Cromwell.
