THE REVIEW

Durham, September 25, 1879.

The Dominion Agricultural Exhibition was opened at Ottawa on Monday. The weather is said to be very fine and the entries of cattle, horses and agricultural products are very numerous.

Speaking as to the destruction of the crops by the unseasonable weather which has prevailed in Great Britain and Ireland during the summer, Dr. J. G. says that it certainly was brought upon the country on account of national sins, among which he enumerated infidelity, encouragement to Roman Catholicism by the Government, Sabbath breaking and profane swearing.

The shareholders of the Consolidated Bank are in session in Montreal. The meetings are very stormy. Grave charges of malfeasance are brought against the President, Sir Francis Huxley, who with several other of the directors, have been removed from office.

A party of Russian engineers have commenced the work of connecting the waters of the Black and Caspian seas by uniting the rivers that flow into them. It is reported that a scheme strongly entertained by Peter the Great, that of turning the waters of the Orus, which at present flow into the sea of Aral, into its old channel by which it was conveyed into the Caspian is again revived.

The American Association of Mining Engineers met at Montreal last week. This Institute was organized in 1871, and includes men of the highest scientific attainments in the United States and Canada. The object of their yearly meetings is to compare notes, and to diffuse information relative to mining and industrial pursuits generally.

The jingo policy of Lord Beaconsfield is bearing its legitimate fruits in the East as well as in the West. In Europe the Berlin settlement is found to have converted that continent into a huge powder magazine which may be discharged at any moment by the jealousy or cupidity of any of the governing politicians.

The Holly heating system has been introduced into London, Ontario. By this system stoves and pipes and all the machinery connected with them would be got rid of, while at the same time a uniform and accurate degree of heat can be obtained at any time, night or day, for all purposes.

THE QUEBEC DEADLOCK.

The state of political affairs in Quebec is unchanged. M. Joly is making a tour of the Province for the purpose of discussing with his fellow countrymen the grave situation of public affairs, and ever where has been received with every token of respect and admiration. In a speech at the city of Quebec at which several thousands were present, when speaking of the points at issue in the present struggle between the Legislative Assembly and the Council he said that "the question was whether the people of the Province of Quebec would submit to be governed by an irresponsible body or would insist upon keeping the management of their own affairs in their own hands."

MR. GLADSTONE ON FARMING.

The versatility of the Ex-Premier of Great Britain is something extraordinary. Whether addressing the House of Commons on the financial question of the day, writing in the Contemporary on the position of the Evangelical party in the Church of England, speaking to the papers of St. Paul's on the duty of Christian resignation, or to the farmers of Hawarden on spade husbandry he is equally at home, equally powerful and equally instructive.

There was a fine display in the Main building, which is a very commodious hall. Mr. Robert McFarlane, of Durham, has on exhibition a very handsome Wagon, a beautiful democrat, a single buggy and a trotting buggy.

Local and Other Items.

Harristonian are trying to work up a new County, of course with Harriston as County Town.

Mr. E. B. McMillan and Dr. Jamieson are erecting offices for themselves next to Burnett's store.

Contracts were let on Monday for the construction of seven miles of the Stratford and Huron Railway.

REVIVAL MEETINGS are being held in Owen Sound by Mr. J. Bennett Anderson. Some excellent meetings have been held.

The Central Exhibition at Guelph was a great success, notwithstanding bad weather and the opposition of Toronto and other small places.

On Tuesday last a young man, brakeman on the H. & N. W. Railway, was killed at Collingwood. The deceased, named Dickson, formerly lived at Guelph.

THERE is considerable grain out yet in some sections, the weather lately having been unfavorable for harvesting. Fall wheat has been sown extensively and is looking well.

DOMINION STATUTES OF 1879.—We are requested by Mr. Armstrong, the Clerk of the Peace, to inform qualified Magistrates in Commission, that he has received the Statutes of last session of the Dominion Legislature for delivery to them.—Owen Sound Tribune.

DEFEATED.—The Wallace sectional bonus by-law for \$5,000 and the Carrick sectional by-law for \$8,000 in aid of the Stratford and Huron Railway were voted upon on Saturday last and defeated. It is expected that another effort will be made to secure a bonus in Carrick—Wallace, however, will doubtless be given up as a hopeless field for further bonus hunting.

FIRES.—A frame house, owned by Mr. Donald Currie, and leased by Mr. W. H. Wallace, on Lot No. 11, concession 7, Egremont, was completely destroyed by fire on Monday night last, together with six boxes of hay, which was in the house, belonging to Mr. Wallace. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary. The house was insured for \$200.—Egremont.

An anniversary Tea-meeting will be held in the Orange Hall, on Oct. 12, con. 2d, Egremont, on Saturday evening, Oct. 4th, in aid of the Union Sabbath School held at that place. AYTON.—A correspondent to the Mount Forest Confederate says:—The blacksmith shop of Mr. Thomas Moran was robbed of a set of fine horse-shoes, made for the exhibition. An harvest home picnic was held on Friday evening under the auspices of the Presbyterian congregation. Addresses were delivered by Messrs. McCullough, Wilson and the Pastor, Mr. Nicol. The music which enlivened the day's proceedings was provided by the Ayton brass band.

LARGE FIRE AT MARKLE.—The River Block at Markle, was destroyed by fire on Thursday morning last. The loss is unknown, but heavy, very little property being saved. The principal losers are Joe McCutcheon, Bevere Hotel and stables; Wilcox, watchmaker and jeweler; Hill Bros., general merchants; McDougall Bros., harness-makers; Spooner, Druggist; Vickers, express agent; T. Matthews, harness-maker and furniture warehouse. The origin of the fire is unknown.

A telegram has been received in Guelph which states that Mrs. Hughes, widow of the late John Hughes, a Guelph painter, was burned to death while attempting to start a fire with coal oil at her house in Brooklyn, N. Y.

THE VICE-REGAL TOUR.

After leaving London on Thursday where the Vice-Regal party were received with great demonstrations of loyalty and affection they were conveyed by special train on the Grand Trunk to Guelph. On the way a halt was made at Berlin where large numbers were assembled to welcome the party. An address in German was read by F. Kranz, M. P., and the Marquis made a happy reply in the same language.

At Guelph the arrangements for the reception of the Governor-General and the Princess were on a very magnificent scale. Their Excellencies on alighting were received by the Mayor, Col. Higinbotham, and other prominent persons. A procession was formed which proceeded to the Acacia Park where the Marquis formally opened the Guelph Show.

Several addresses were read and replies given, and after an hour spent in examining the Exhibition the Marquis was entertained at a banquet in the City Hall. Shortly after the banquet a reception was held in the Council Chamber after which the party immediately returned to their train and reached Toronto shortly after six o'clock.

Thursday and Friday were spent in Toronto. On Thursday forenoon a second visit was made to the Exhibition and in the afternoon the foundation stone of a Hospital for Leucrales—the only institution of the kind in the Dominion—was laid by Her Royal Highness. Before and after the ceremony the Vice-Regal party were addressed as to the nature and design of the institution or "Home," as it is called, by the Rev. D. Topp and Potts.

On Friday the Vice-Regal party bade adieu to Toronto. An immense crowd had assembled at the station to bid the distinguished guests goodbye and shortly after 9 o'clock the train moved off among the enthusiastic cheers of the people, reaching Ottawa about nine in the evening. During the journey the train stopped at Watlity, Port Hope, Cobourg and Belleville, where the usual addresses of welcome were presented by the civic authorities. The Globe says that during the visit of their Excellencies to Toronto, they have proved themselves, from a social point of view, well fitted for the high positions which they occupy, and that by their kind demeanor and lively interest in everything brought before them they have established themselves in the affections of the people.

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The Show.

The Great Toronto Show is over, the Walkerton Show is drawing to a close, but the Show par excellence, which of all others will be of the greatest interest and importance to our readers is the South Grey Agricultural Exhibition which will be held on the Society's Grounds, in Durham, on Tuesday and Wednesday next. The grounds recently purchased, would seem to be everything that could be desired, being commodious, naturally well drained, easily accessible and more picturesque in situation than most places suitable for the purposes of the Society. There is no doubt but the exhibition of live stock and all agricultural products will fully sustain the reputation of the County as an agricultural district.

Among the interesting features of the Show days is the Bazaar under the auspices of the ladies of the Presbyterian Church of this town. The Bazaar will be open on Tuesday and Wednesday in the Town Hall, and from the well known reputation of the ladies in enterprises of this sort there is no question but this Bazaar will be equal, if not superior, to anything of the kind seen before.
