MEETING OF DIRECTORS AT BWEN SOUND.

OWEN SOUND, Sept. 80 .- The directors of

the T. G. & B. Railway visited Owen Sound on Mouday, and invited the business men of the town to meet them at the Utteen's hotel, with a view to an interchange of ideas as to what the town of Owen Sound could; or would, do along with the tewnships adjacent to the line of railway; le the way of assisting the directors by bonus, to widen the gauge, and place the road generally in a better condition.
