They form a part of those grand arrangements of an all wise providence, which begin with our birth and end with our death. There is seldom a line of glory written upon the earth's face but a line of suffering runs parallel with it; and they that read the lustrous syl'ables of the one, and stop not to decipher the spotted and worn inscription of the other, get the lesson earth has to give.
