Five People Murdered by Masked Men.

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THE MURDER OF JOHN DONNELLY.

THE INQUEST.

The jury, composed of villagers, after a thorough inspection of the premises, returned home, and was summoned to meet again in the town hall at seven o'clock.

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County Council

Continued From the Times

The Council met at 2 p.m. pursuant to adjournment from Wednesday evening.

A petition was read from 40 ratepayers of the Township of Melancthon, relative to construction of a siding; also a communication from Jas. Munro, Esq. Minister in-Chief, relative to office rent.

Moved by Mr. Middleton, seconded by Mr. August, That the Warden and Clerk be requested to forward to the Board of Directors of the T. G. & C. R. a petition asking for the construction of a siding in the Township of Melancthon, as requested in position—Carried.

By-law No. 278 appointing Auditors, and By-law No. 279 appointing High School Trustees were passed.

Moved by Mr. Cleland, seconded by Mr. Read, That before the usual grant be given for the three Riding Agricultural Societies of this County, that a statement of their affairs, showing receipts and expenditure, number of members, and amount donated by individuals or companies as special prizes, is to be presented to the Council.—Carried.

Mr. Sparrow gave notice of motion that he would apply to-morrow for a grant of \$100 to build approaches to bridge on County line between Sullivan and Apsara.

The deputation on behalf of the construction of a House of Refuge, then addressed the Council.

The special committee relative to By-law 174 presented report of the same. The report gave figures in connection with By-law, and recommended that interest on debentures be applied to liquidation of coupons maturing.

The Council went into committee of the whole on above report. The report was passed in committee without amendment.

The Clerk was instructed to report to-morrow the number of vagrants committed to goal in 1879, cost of maintenance, cost of fuel, and other expenses attending arrest, amount of stone broken and amount derived from sale of fees.

The report of special committee on By-law No. 174 was adopted.

Mr. Sing then read report of County Property Committee. The report stated the committee had had under their consideration the matter of removing broken stone from the goal yard, and recommending that a written agreement be entered into with the corporation of Owen Sound to remove all broken stone as required by the gaoler.

The report was adopted and the Council adjourned till 10 o'clock Friday morning.

ERIDAY MORNING. The Council met at 10 o'clock. Minutes of yesterday read and confirmed.

Mr. Cleland read report of special committee appointed to enquire into the Treasurer's account of bonded security held; and stated that after examination and enquiry the committee were satisfied that the Council had ample security.

On motion made and seconded report was adopted.

Moved by Mr. Knott, seconded by Mr. McNaught, That Messrs. Sing, Ganey, McKechnie, Murdoch, Christie, White and Cleland be a special committee to enquire and report at present session on salaries and efficiency of officers of Council, and recommend any change if necessary.—Carried.

Dr. Christie read report of Finance Committee. In reference to communication of the Deputy Master and Registrar-in-Chief, the committee considered it the duty of the Council to furnish him with office, light and fuel, and recommending an annual payment of \$60 a year for that purpose, which if not accepted, then Chairman of County Property Committee to rent two rooms, providing they cannot be furnished in the Court House. In reference to communication of W. Armstrong, in reference to stationery, the committee recommended payment of \$10 for 1879. The committee also recommended the purchase of four debentures of \$1000 each, under By-law 174, advertised for sale, and as many more as could be purchased at a rate not exceeding 101, considering our County debentures the best security. The committee also recommended payment of several accounts, and in reference to the matter of re-adjustment or re-valuation of County, recommended that no valuator be appointed, but that original valuation be the basis of assessment.

The report of Finance Committee was adopted.

Moved by Mr. McNeil, seconded by Mr. Murdoch, That a special committee, consisting of the Reeves of Armesonia, Moorfield, Collingwood, 1st Dep.-Reeve of Normanby, Dep.-Reeve of St. Vincent and the mover be appointed to enquire into the propriety of memorializing the Legislature of Ontario to amend the Municipal Law so as to reduce the number of County Councillors, and report at this session.—Carried.

Mr. McNeil said the motion was really the Warden's idea. He did not wish to get popularity by it, but only wished to express an opinion of the Council on the question.

Moved by Mr. Christie, seconded by Mr. Pedlar, That the Treasurer cause to be printed with the minutes statements showing the arrears of each municipality down to the latest point possible before minutes are printed.

The report of the Road and Bridge Committee was read, stating that the committee had had under consideration the petition of ratepayers of Sullivan, asking for grant to open County line between Sullivan and Apsara, but could not recommend the grant.

On motion the report was adopted.

A motion was made by Mr. McNeil, seconded by Mr. Ganey, in reference to memorializing the Governor-General to utilize the labor of vagrants in the prison walls.

After some discussion the motion was adopted.
