The British House of Commons is to be dissolved at Easter.

Our readers will be glad to know that arrangements are in progress by which it is expected that the Georgian Bay and Wellington Railway will be completed and put into running order within a few months.

Mr. O'Connell, an ultra member of the Conservative party in the House of Commons, and one who practically distinguished himself by his coarse language and threats against the Governor General in the Legislature, has introduced a Bill to re-nest Dual Representation.

THE ONTARIO SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE. The fifth Annual Report of the Ontario School of Agriculture has been issued.

It contains, in addition to a financial exhibit of the state of the College and the course of study pursued, a great deal of information about varieties and management of live stock, root crops and cereals and the effect of manures upon these, which although too often given in a very confused way, must be of great advantage to the practical farmer who carefully peruses this report.

in the Public Schools, Botany, Meteorology, Veterinary Medicine and Surgery, Agricultural Chemistry and Practical Agriculture and Horticulture. Tuition is free, but students are required to pay for their board and washing at the rate of \$2.15 a week for the former and about thirty cents a dozen for the latter.

The comparative merits of the various breeds of cattle and sheep have received great attention at the College, and as the result of the experience thus gained, Professor Brown states in his Report, that upon the whole, the Short Horn Grade is superior to any other, being first in withstanding changes of climate, feeding properties, prolificness, and early maturity, though inferior to the Devon and Ayrshire in quantity and richness of milk.

Very elaborate experiments seem to have been carried on as to the effect of manures on cereals and root crops, but as no chemical analysis of the soil was made, either before or after cropping, this portion of the report is necessarily imperfect.

Scientific medicine and quackery can never come into collision, nor can the former be ever injured by the latter. The one addresses the crowd, the other deals with the individual. The doctor uses a discriminating treatment the quack a universal remedy. The quack however has the advantage of ignorance and ignorance. He is in Durham to-day and at Pricerville to-morrow; this year in Ontario, and the next possibly in New Brunswick or Nova Scotia. He is under no compulsion of Science or conscience, and before experience has set down his remedies at their proper value, he has fled to parts unknown. But time will convince the public that the loud pretensions of quackery are not to be relied upon, and that when the hour of trial does come their stay must be placed on scientific medicine. However, and with all elarity we say it, the quackery which does the most injury to scientific medicine is not that which is outside the profession but that which is in it. The low arts, which give a temporary success to the progress of the mountebank, form in many cases a large part of the stock in trade of the doctor; too often members of the regular profession consort with these men, to whom they are avowedly opposed both in theory and practice; and the public are thus misled, and the charge made by Adam Smith holds as good to day as it did a hundred years ago, "that the success of quacks is altogether owing to the real quackery of the regular practitioners."

Normanby Council. The Council of the Township of Normanby met per adjournment last meeting at the Township Hall, on Friday, the 20th day of February, 1880.

Present—John König, Reeve; John Blyth, First Deputy-Reeve; Wm. Winkler, Second Deputy-Reeve, and Hugh Ball and Conrad Fisher, Councillors.

Minutes of last meeting read and passed. Moved by Mr. Blyth, seconded by Mr. Ball, That Andrew Balm be paid \$12 for work on town lines, Carriek and Normanby, and that said amount be deducted from the original grant of \$100 to said line.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. König, seconded by Mr. Fisher, That the Treasurer pay the sub-treasurer of school monies the sum of \$800, to pay school teachers, cheques.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Blyth, seconded by Mr. Winkler, That the cost of audit to the amount of \$27 be paid.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Ball, seconded by Mr. Fisher, That the application of Mr. Stone to procure fuel from hardwood on line between Lots 20 and 21, 9th concession, be refused.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winkler, seconded by Mr. Fisher, That the account of F. Hartman for coffin to old man Aurf be laid over until next meeting.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Blyth, seconded by Mr. Winkler, That the application of E. Curran be granted and that William's name be struck from Collector's roll of 1879 and that taxes for said year be not returned.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winkler, seconded by Mr. Fisher, That material for the late election be paid for, amounting to \$5.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winkler, seconded by Mr. Fisher, That in future large bridges which will require to be built be paid for from the general fund and that the Reeve and Councillors of the division in which such bridges are required first report all particulars relative thereto for action of Council thereon.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Blyth, seconded by Mr. Ball, in amendment, That all new bridges that may be required over rivers known as Beauty's Saugeen and south branch of Saugeen be built out of Township funds and any repairs required on any bridges or any other new bridges that may be needed in this township to be charged to division funds.—Lost.

Moved by Mr. Blyth, seconded by Mr. Winkler, That \$2 be allowed for making out all papers relative to formation of Roman Catholic Separate School Section No. 5, Normanby.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Blyth, seconded by Mr. Winkler, That the Township printing for the current year be left to tender and that the printing office in Mount Fore, Durham, Harrison, Clifford and Neustadt be asked to tender, Clerk sending schedule of work to be done, said tenders to be received to be opened at next meeting of Council. Council do not bind themselves to accept the lowest or any tender.—Carried.

ONTARIO LEGISLATURE. TORONTO, March 4. The consideration of the Municipal and Taxation Bill was resumed in Committee.

Mr. Calvin moved that the Bill be amended so as to provide for the delimitation of the indebtedness of any person from his personal property, and that he be only assessed on the balance.

Mr. Mowat, in speaking to Mr. Calvin's amendment, said he thought the members had not quite understood the force of the amendment. He himself was convinced that no indebtedness should be subtracted from the value of a man's personal property in assessing it. He would move that the matter be referred back to Committee of the Whole to have the clause inserted by Mr. Calvin struck out.

The motion was carried, and the Bill as amended was read a third time.

Mr. Meredith asked why the Supplementary estimates for the amount proposed to be expended this year on Parliament Buildings had not been brought down.

Mr. Mowat said that such Supplementary Estimates were unnecessary, as the House had already granted the whole amount required for the new buildings.

Mr. Wood moved to introduce a Bill to vote Her Majesty certain sums of money to defray the expenses of a civil government in 1880.

The Bill was read a first, second and third time and passed.

The House went into Committee on Mr. Mowat's Bill respecting the administration of justice in the districts of Algoma, Thunder Bay, and Nipissing. The Bill was reported with some amendments, and was read a third time and passed.

Mr. Mowat moved the adjournment of the House.

THE HOUSE PROCEEDED. Toronto, March 5. At three o'clock His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, accompanied by Captain Law, A. D. C., drove down to the Parliament Buildings. As soon as the carriage debouched from the gates of the Government House the Field Battery, which was stationed on Wellington street, began the firing of a salute. The galleries and body of the House were well filled. The following are the more important bills assented to:—

commodation for the Legislature. The House of Commons has engaged attention. I trust that, without exceeding the estimated cost, buildings will be fully equal to the demands of the service and in all respects worthy of great and wealthy Province.

The readiness with which you have a sum of money for the relief of suffering fellow-subjects in Ireland will surely be warmly appreciated by the affluence of a fresh crop of the commonwealth of interest and sympathy unite the people of the many separated portions of Her Majesty's dominions.

The Bill incorporating the Agricultural College, which has just become law, the sense entertained by you of the importance of that institution to the benefit of Ontario, and the confidence thus expressed will be shared to a large extent by all classes of people. As the utility of this institution will be further demonstrated by experience, its effect to the proposition to an Agricultural Commission, and for any outlay so incurred the most beneficial results.

The extension of the jurisdiction of the Division Courts will tend to secure large number of suitors a more less expensive means for enforcing demands, while other amendments sanctioned by you will add to the efficiency of the tribunals.

The important amendments in the principal law resulting from your deliberations more particularly those which reduce the number of statutory exemptions and certain changes in the incidence of taxation, cannot fail to be of great benefit.

While the subject is surrounded by considerable difficulty, it may reasonably be expected that your enquiries and best means for providing security against accidents to brakemen and other servants will in due time result in a measure which will do desirable good to the employees of the railways.
