

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, April 12.

Mr. Abbott introduced a Bill to provide for the distribution of the assets of insolvent traders.

On the motion to receive the report of the Committee on Ways and Means, which include the tariff amendments, Mr. Paterson (Beant) again directed the Finance Minister's attention to the fact that embossed books for the blind were still subjected to an enormous duty owing to their expense, and he contrasted the taxation imposed by the Canadian Government on the literature for the blind with the liberal policy pursued by the Provincial and foreign Governments.

In conclusion, he moved that the report be referred back to the Committee with instructions to amend the same by placing embossed books for the blind upon the free list.

Sir Leonard Tilley stated that the Government had considered the proposition and could not consent to the change.

Mr. Blake and Sir Richard Cartwright both announced their intention of supporting the amendment, not only on grounds of compassion but on grounds of justice, as owing to the increased cost of embossed books ordinary printers, etc., the tariff discriminated against the blind.

From these remarks it became clear that the members were to be called in, and there was a remarkable nervousness among the Government supporters, and quite a few began looking for their hats.

Sir John Macdonald saw the danger of defeat, and jumping up suddenly ignored Sir Leonard's statement that the Government had unflinchingly considered the matter, and said that his hon. friend had no objection to offer to the amendment save the delay it would cause.

A more lame excuse than this cannot be imagined when it is mentioned that the amendment was carried, referred to Committee, incorporated in the resolutions, and adopted by the House within two minutes after wards. This is the first amendment made to the tariff by the Opposition.

The House went into Committee of Supply. On the item of \$100,000 for Immigration and Quarantine the debate turned upon the distribution of Yankee literature by the Department of Agriculture. From the speeches made it appeared that the Minister of Agriculture valued 20,000 copies of a pamphlet entitled "The Little Mountain District and Southern Manitoba," which contained an advertisement of Yankee lands, printed in the Montreal Globe office, and that after the Globe had directed attention to the fact, before the pamphlets had been delivered to the Department, at the Minister's instigation the advertisement was cut out.

Another disclosure during the debate was that the stations along the International Railway are being used for the purpose of inducing by advertisements Canadians to immigrate to the United States.

OTTAWA, April 13.

The House was again in Committee of Supply, taking up the vote for Militia, \$980,200, a decrease of \$20,000.

On the item, Salaries of Brigade Majors, \$17,400.

Mr. Stange remarked that the vote of Parliament for the maintenance of our militia force was totally inadequate, and the result was that the force was so inefficient that it could not be moved from one place to another without the aid of the military.

Mr. Mackenzie moved the adjournment of the House, and the speaker left the chair at 12:15 a.m.
