

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, May 5.

The House went into Committee on the Bill to amend the Dominion Lands Act, 1879, and, at the suggestion of Mr. Blake, made an amendment providing that all regulations for the disposal of coal or other mineral lands in the North West shall, besides being properly advertised in the Canada Gazette, be submitted to Parliament for thirty days for the approval of both Houses.

The House went into Committee on the Bill entitled "An Act to amend 'An Act relating to Banks and Banking,'" and to continue for a limited time the Charter of certain Banks to which the said Act applies. Several amendments were made, one among the number declaring that if any corporation or private person do publicly style themselves or himself a "bank," such act shall be punished as a misdemeanor.

Mr. Bates Stevenson moved concurrence in the report of the Printing Committee, recommending that the contract with Messrs. Leach, Reger, & Co., be cancelled, because it was obtained by improper practices. Messrs. Blake and Ross (Middlesex) contended that the report signed by the Chairman (Mr. Stephenson) was not an accurate record of the Committee's finding, and therefore should be referred back to the Committee for amendment—the fact being that the Committee had adopted by a majority vote the report of a Sub-Committee, which was not included in the present report.

The House went into Committee on the resolutions of declaring the expediency of substituting certain resolutions for the 7th of the series relating to the Pacific Railway adopted last year. The proposed resolutions appropriate one hundred million acres in Manitoba and the North West Territories, the revenue resulting from the sale of which will be utilized in defraying the cost of constructing the road. A short debate ensued, during which Sir John Macdonald stated on the authority of officers in his Department that there were, exclusive of that in British Columbia and the land known as the northern section of the Montana Desert, which, however, Prof. Macoun thought was fit for settlement, no less than 200 million acres of fertile land in the North West Territories.

Mr. Blake said this announcement was very satisfactory, but did not accord with the statement made by the Minister of Railways, that there were only one hundred and fifty million acres there. This led to an explanation by Sir Charles Tupper, and after some further discussion the Committee reported the resolution.

On motion by Sir Charles Tupper the House approved of the construction of the second one hundred mile section of the Canada Pacific Railway west of Winnipeg.

Sir Leonard Tilley moved the second reading of the Supply Bill.

Mr. Blake gave a number of practical suggestions as to the conduct of future sessions, and pointed out the defects of the present. Sir John Macdonald briefly noticed some of the objections taken.

The Supply Bill then passed the final stage. The Report of the *Hansard* Committee appointing the reporting staff for next session was adopted.

THE PROSECUTION.

OTTAWA, MAY 7.

This day, at four o'clock p. m., His Excellency the Governor General proceeded in State to the Chamber of the Senate in the Parliament Buildings, and took his seat upon the Throne. The members of the Senate being assembled, His Excellency was pleased to command the attendance of the House of Commons, and that House being present, the following bills were assented to in His Majesty's name by His Excellency the Governor General.

An act to amend the act entitled "An act respecting offences against the person," and to repeal the act entitled "An act to provide that persons charged with common assault shall be competent as witnesses."

An act respecting the Credit Valley Railway Company.

An act to extend the powers of the Manitoba South Western Colonization Railway Company, and to further amend the act incorporating the said Company.

An act respecting the Ontario Reformatory for boys.

An act to repeal the act extending the Dominion lands to British Columbia, and to make other provisions with respect to certain public lands in that Province.

An act for the relief of Permanent Building Societies and Loan Companies.

An act to incorporate the Great North Western Telegraph Company of Canada.

An act to amend the acts respecting the Montreal Telegraph Company.

An act for the appointment of a resident representative Agent for Canada in the United Kingdom.

An act to amend the act 42nd Victoria, chap. 15, entitled "An act to alter the duties of Customs and Excise."

An act respecting the "Industrial Relief for Girls" of Ontario.

An act to amend and consolidate the several acts relating to the North West Territories.

An act respecting the administration of criminal justice in the territory in dispute between the Governments of the Province of Ontario and of the Dominion of Canada.

An act further to amend the acts respecting the Dominion Lands Act of 1879.

An act to consolidate and amend the acts respecting the Inland Revenue.

accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill.

After which His Excellency the Governor-General was pleased to sign the second session of the fourth Parliament of the Dominion with the following

PROBATION SPEECH.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons.

In referring you from your attendance in Parliament, I desire to offer my thanks for the care and assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the performance of your important duties.

The evidences of a recovery from the long continued depression to which the country alluded at the opening of the session are, I am glad to believe steadily accumulating, and we may, I trust, look forward with confidence to a prosperous year.

The measures relating to banking and the currency and to the amendment of the tariff, with the other laws passed this session, will, I hope, aid in the prosecution of the anticipated prosperity.

The expectations of a large immigration of valuable settlers into the North-West, in which I then ventured to indulge, appear from latest information to be fully realized.

The laws for the better organization of the North-West Territories, for the amendment of the Dominion Lands Act, and for the more efficient management of Indian affairs must tend greatly to the advantage of that vast and interesting region.

The measures for the consolidation of the laws concerning the Inland Revenue, and other important Acts relating to public interests, seem well adapted to promote those interests.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I thank you in Her Majesty's name for the supplies you have so liberally voted. I trust the vigorous efforts made to settle the Indian bands of the North-West on their reserves will diminish in the future all calls made on the Public Treasury for aid to save them from starvation.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons: The appropriations made will enable my Government steadily to prosecute the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway, and to hasten the completion of four canal systems.

In bidding you farewell I desire to express my earnest desire for your happiness and prosperity in your several homes.

In Collingwood the assessed value of real estate is \$904,398, being an increase over 1879 of \$41,438; personal property, \$26,000, an increase over last year of \$410; and incomes \$19,800, or an increase of \$5,400. The population of the town is 4,315, being an increase since 1879 of 221.

According to the London Daily News of April 20 a number of very superior Canadian cattle were landed at Liverpool on the 17th ult. from the steamship Brooklyn. They were shipped by Messrs. Frankland, Thompson & Livingston, of Toronto. They fetched in the Liverpool market the extraordinary price of \$225 each. Many of them were prize winners in the Dominion, and had all been bred and fed at the Guelph Model Farm.

SPEEDY JUSTICE.—On Sunday forenoon Chief Constable Bolton of Clifford was informed that John Feather, of that village had been robbed of his purse containing \$60 in cash, a cheque on the Bank of Montreal for \$12.45 and three promissory notes. He took the case in hand and the same evening arrested Charles Lawrence alias Wilson in whose possession the stolen property was found. On Monday the prisoner was arraigned before Mr. Alim, J. P. and committed to Guelph gaol for trial. He arrived here on Monday evening and this (Tuesday) morning was arraigned before Judge Chadwick at the County Court. The prisoner pleaded guilty to the theft and was sentenced to three months imprisonment at the Central Prison. The money was recovered except \$6.85.—Guelph Mercury.

M. E. CHURCH CONFERENCE.—The Ontario annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada opened its eighteenth session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, Port Perry, on Thursday, 29th ult. Bishop Carman presided and delivered a most interesting opening address. A large amount of business was transacted. The origin of the fire is unknown. The remains were not recognizable. The youngest victim was burned in her bed. One of the others was lying by the bed and the other lying by the door with a lamp by her side.
