

CANADIAN ITEMS.

Charles Larkin, who was stabbed a few days ago by Michael Dolan, at Montreal died on Friday.

A London township farmer named Alex. McLaughlin committed suicide by hanging on Thursday forenoon.

Mr. Joseph Northwood, of Chatham, has been appointed to the Senate in the place of the late Hon. George Brown.

A French Canadian named Jean Dapiste Fortin has been arrested at Ottawa, charged with having three wives.

A revision of the assessment rolls shows that Peterborough has a population of 6,495, a reduction of 111 since last year.

The Council of Wingham village favour a bonus of \$15,000 or \$20,000 for an extension of the Toronto, Grey, & Bruce Railway to that village.

Owing to the destruction by fire of the office of the Fenelon Falls Gazette that paper is issuing for a few weeks a sheet printed only on one side, that being done in Toronto.

The cattle fair at Hanover on Monday, was rather poorly attended. Cows were chiefly what was offered and brought from \$20 to \$30.—Bruce Herald.

A new Roman Catholic church was dedicated at Wallaceburg on Sunday by Bishop Walsh, of London. The attendance was very large. The church is built of brick, and cost \$12,700.

The Quebec City Reform Club has resolved to give a grand dinner to Mr. Blake in the Ancient Capital, to occur about the beginning of next month. The club has four hundred subscribing members.

Joseph Hudson, who died at Faversham on the 8th inst., in his 75th year, was an Englishman, and one of the first settlers in Albion township, and next in Osprey. He took an active interest in public reforms.

The Oka Indians are again in trouble, one of them having split open the head of a French Canadian who went to take possession of a lot of land within their reserve which he had acquired from the Seminary at Montreal.

The ship laborers employed by the Allan Steamship Company of Montreal, to the number of three hundred and fifty, struck work last Thursday evening.

The Government of Ontario have notified the Directors of the Toronto, Grey, & Bruce Railway that they have appointed the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie a Trustee, on their behalf, to take delivery of the bonuses which are now about to be voted by the municipalities to aid the Company in changing the gauge of the line.

During a thunderstorm on Wednesday Mrs. Henry Nisbett, of Gifford, was instantly killed by lightning. She was in the act of filling a pail of water outside the door when the lightning struck her. She leaves two young children.

A runaway accident occurred on the Franco road on Saturday afternoon, whereby Mrs. Henry Duffield, Franco, received a severe scalp wound in the fore part of the head, and a number of severe bruises about the head and body. Her condition is serious and her recovery is doubtful.

A young man named William P. Fohi was drowned near Walkerton, on Friday afternoon while washing sheep. He was taking a swim after finishing his own sheep, and becoming exhausted, sank in presence of his companions, not one of whom was able to swim to his assistance. The body was recovered immediately afterwards.

The Tilsburg Observer says:—The buildings for the manufacture of sorghum sugar are now up and nearly enclosed. They present a very neat appearance. We believe that there will be nearly 300 acres of sorghum planted in this vicinity this year, so that the factory will have a full supply to test its capacity for sugar-making and prove to farmers that it is more profitable than their usual grain crops.

A serious accident happened to Mr. McCouchie, a farmer residing near Elora village, on Saturday, 15th inst. He had driven his horse to a hay-stack and was loading lumber on his wagon when the horses started. In endeavoring to stop them, being an old man of threescore, he lost his footing, and the front wheels of the wagon passed over the small of his back, causing severe internal injury. He now lies in a critical condition.
