A Mrs. Lewis. member of the Presbyterian Church of Arthur, left her husband on the ground of alleged infidelity. After living separately for some years she removed to Illinois where she resided for eighteen months, and having obtained a divorce in that State she returned to Arthur and then married a Mr. Phillips six months afterwards. The divorce thus obtained in Illinois is not valid in Candada, and the question brought before the Assembly by appeal from the inferior courts, was, whether her standing as a member of the Church should be disturbed? After a long debate the Assembly decided by a large majority that the divorce and the marriage which followed should ments of Christian duty, and that Mrs. Phillips cannot be recognized as a member of the Church until she has first of all complied with the requirements of the civil law of Canada.
