The case was first tried before Mr. Justice Iette, of one of the Superior Courts of Quebec, and dismissed with costs. An appeal was taken, and a similar decision has been recently given by the Court of Queen's Bench. The mal-contents have now appealed to the Privy Council. The case has so far turned on the right of the Quebec Legislature to pass an Act dealing with a Church Society which was incorporated by an Act of the old Canadian Parliament. Chief Justice Dorion held that questions of "Property and Civil Rights" are among the questions coming under the jurisdiction of the Local Legislatures under the British North of A.
