A box was put in a cool place in a collar; a stone jar would answer as well. ther of them all ; and the letters of appre- aster. The volcanic smoke and ashes will, other parts of the Continent. There is a A layer of salt was put in the box, then a layer of eggs with the large ends downwards, the eggs not touching one another; then another layer of salt, then eggs, and so on till the box was filled, the last being salt. Cover the box; and let it stand undisturbed till needed for use. We have used eggs packed in this way for six or nine months, perfectly good for the table.
