 A delegate asked if the proposed scheme
 had been before the Grand Trunk Board
 in England, or whether the suggestion had
 been made only to Mr. Hickson.
 Mr. Beatty said there had been a formal
 application to the Board in England.
 Mr. Scott asked whether, if the line was
 leased to the Grand Trunk, the rolling
 stock would have to be supplied the same
 as if it was being rebuilt by the present
 Company.
 Mr. Worts replied that the road must
 be thoroughly equipped before the Grand
 Trunk would touch it.
 A delegate asked if any portion of the
 \$450,000 proposed to be raised by the bond-
 holders would go to pay the interest in ar-
 rears.
 Mr. Worts replied in the negative. All
 arrears of interest would be sunk, and the
 money would be invested in the proposed
 change.
 The Chairman called on Mr. W. H. Bes-
 ty, Solicitor of the Company to address the
 meeting.
 Mr. Beatty said the three alternatives
 he understood them, were, first, that the
 Company as now constituted would either
 take hold of the matter and ask the munic-
 ipalities to help them to the extent of
 \$400,000 to lay steel rails over the whole
 line from Toronto to Owen Sound, laying
 the old iron on the Teaswater branch; the
 next proposition was one which would
 with which there had been no negotia-
 tions entered into with Mr. Hickson, as to
 what could be done if the line were put
 in good order. It was found that the Grand
 Trunk, from its superior facilities, could
 rebuild the road at a saving of \$100,000 to
 the municipalities. In going through the
 country he found the almost universal feel-
 ing of dissatisfaction with the Company,
 and a conviction that if some other Com-
 pany took hold of the line they might grant
 some aid to it. Now, Mr. Hickson was
 prepared to take the road on these condi-
 tions and run it for twenty years, and
 then hand it back if it became necessary,
 but his proposition was directly given to
 one year under Grand Trunk control it
 would probably remain in their hands. As
 far as the raising of the money was con-
 cerned, it would be necessary for the pres-
 ent bondholders to step in and help, and
 let another issue be put ahead of them to
 raise the necessary funds.
 The meeting then adjourned, and at the
 Directors the delegates repaired to the
 Walker House, where lunch was partaken
 of.
 AFTERNOON MEETING.
 The delegates reassembled in the afternoon,
 and elected Mr. Frain, Warden of Well-
 ington, to the chair.
 S. R. Lane, M. P., thought that notwith-
 standing the large amount already given
 aid the road the intelligent portion of
 the ratepayers would think it to their interest
 to make a further grant rather than have it
 closed or run at a loss for many years to
 come. He did not think it unreasonable
 some time. He did not think it unreasonable
 on the part of the Company to come before
 the municipalities for further aid, because it
 was not to keep the road in existence, but for
 a permanent improvement that was not in-
 tended at the time when the road was con-
 structed. To have a good live road calcu-
 lated to meet the wants of the country it would
 be necessary to widen the gauge and furnish
 proper equipment. He would move for the
 following resolution, seconded by Mr. Scott:
 Resolved, That having heard the explana-
 tion given by the Directors of the Toronto,
 Grey, and Bruce Railway Company, it is the
 opinion of this meeting in the interest of
 the district of country served by the railway
 that the gauge should be changed to the
 standard gauge of 4 feet 8 1/2 inches, and that
 an arrangement should be made for the work-
 ing of it by the Grand Trunk, and therefore
 the Directors should make every effort, in
 conjunction with the municipalities, to carry
 out a change of gauge and make an arrange-
 ment with the Grand Trunk for the working
 of the line.
 Mr. Swan thought there was no prospect
 of getting \$15,000 additional from Mount
 Forest. It might be well enough for Owen
 Sound, where large returns are expected, but
 the people in his municipality would not sup-
 port it.
 Mr. Finlay MacRae said that the Grand
 Trunk already had, or was about to have, con-
 trol of the Stations at Lake Huron and the
 Georgian Bay and Wellington lines, and
 would have too much power if it secured a
 lease of this road also. The township of
 Glenora, as a whole, would not give any fur-
 ther aid, as a sectional bonus might succeed.
 Mr. McMullen, of Mount Forest, Vice-
 President of the Georgian Bay and Well-
 ington Railway, said that before the construction
 of that line the people would have supported
 a scheme like that proposed, but they could
 not be induced to vote a bonus to this line
 provided it fell into the hands of the Grand
 Trunk, because they already had control of
 the Georgian Bay and Wellington. He
 was sorry that the people of Toronto were
 solely responsible for the narrow gauge, and
 when it now became necessary to make it a
 broad gauge they should come down and pay
 something towards the cost of the change.
 Mr. Scott, ex-M. P. for Grey, reminded
 the last speaker that the Georgian Bay and
 Wellington was constructed and homone-
 sprung up to be developed under the im-
 petus given to trade by the railway. He
 would favour the resolution.
 Mr. Wair, Reeve of Howick, said that the
 route by the T. G. & B. R. to Toronto and
 Montreal was fifty miles shorter than via
 Stratford. He was in favor of widening the
 road and leasing it to the Grand Trunk. It
 was well known that the Chairman and the

 The motion was then put to the meeting and
 declared carried.
 As the Directors were possessed of all re-
 quisite information for the purpose of lay-
 ing the \$300,000 on the municipalities to be vot-
 ed upon, they were requested to prepare the same
 and submit them to the people. A vote of
 thanks was tendered to the Chairman and the
 meeting adjourned, the delegates leaving the
 city for their homes at 6 o'clock.
 In the report of Mr. Scott's remarks at the

 Wednesday evening he was made to say that

THE CHATSWORTH DIVISION COURT CLERK.
 SIR,—For various reasons we exceedingly
 regret having to refer to this matter, but
 the statement in last week's Times, that
 "Recently the office of Division Court Clerk
 had been taken from him," (the late Mr.
 Cardwell) and the trouble in connection
 with this is believed to have prompted him
 to the rash act" might leave it to be in-
 ferred that he was removed at the instig-
 ation of the Government or its friends, and
 consequently compels us, in justice to all
 concerned, to lay the facts of the case be-
 fore the public, so that there may be a clear
 understanding as to the grounds of his
 removal, as well as to the sources from
 which it came. It is to be hoped that the
 following letter, written by Mr. Cardwell
 to the Hon. Mr. Hardy, the Provincial
 Secretary, on the 25th of May last, will
 make the matter clear:
 "DIVISION COURT OFFICE,
 CHATSWORTH, 25th May, 1880.
 "DEAR SIR,—Today I received a note
 from Judge Macpherson as follows:
 "Owen Sound, May 24 1880.
 "DEAR SIR,—As you have not filed
 new bonds within the time allowed by the
 Statute, you have forfeited your office as
 Clerk of the Sixth Division Court of the
 County of Grey. You will therefore deliv-
 er all papers, books, etc., in your possession
 as such Clerk to the County Attorney
 or your successor on demand. I to-
 day notified the Provincial Secretary of
 the vacancy."
 "His Honor had previously transmitted
 the requisite printed forms of Bond, &c.,
 and required my sureties to justify in
 \$1,000 each, and myself in \$2,000, which
 are too large sums for this court. He re-
 spects the annual amount of business trans-
 acted, considering the sums too much, I
 did not trouble myself about getting sure-
 ties, and concluded to give up the Court,
 as shortly I should have to do from age
 and attending infirmities."
 "Yours respectfully,
 "HENRY CARDWELL, Clerk."
 It will be seen from the letter of Mr.
 Cardwell's, that neither the Government
 nor its friends acted in any way harshly in
 the matter, but on the contrary as lenient
 as possible, and that it was not until
 His Honor, the Judge, notified the Pro-
 vincial Secretary that the office was vacant,
 and until Mr. Cardwell himself notified the
 Provincial Secretary that "considering the
 sums too much I did not trouble myself
 about getting sureties, and concluded to
 give up the Court," that the Government
 took any action in the matter.—Owen
