It would appear from the above despatch from the Inspector, that there had been a later fire in the mine. It now seems that the dead in the Saham mine number between 130 and 140. There are some corpses in the lower seams which are supposed to be a mile from the shuft. The air there is so foul that it is thought to be almost impossible that any could have survived.

LATER.-The exploration of the Seaham mine was continued throughout the night. The statement that sixty-six men has been rescued alive has been confirmed. 
