Gunpowder plots in England.

The police who were on duty Tuesday night at Birkenhead, near the Woodside ferry, which connects Birkenhead with Liverpool, had their attention attracted to the suspicious movements of three men who were carrying sacks towards the Woodside landing. The men seemed anxious to escape observation, and proceeded furtively from point to point, keeping as much as possible within the shadow of buildings or vessels. Apprehending some illegal proceeding, the police made a descent upon and arrested the men. They at first attempted to escape, but seeing themselves overpowered, surrendered to the officers. On examination, one of the men, who appeared to be the spokesman for the party, gave his name as Fernandez, and said he was a Spaniard, and offered the police a sovereign to be released, saying that the sacks contained revolvers to be shipped to Spain, and that he and his companions were entirely innocent of any intention to commit any crime what ever. Not satisfied with this explanation, the police detained the men and opened the sacks, which were found to contain six cwt. of gunpowder which was packed in casks.

CANADIAN ITEMS.

Burglars are operating at Port Elgin. An attempt was made by 4 prisoners to escape from London Jail. By the explosion in a carriage building at Bridgeport, Conn., on Friday, 5 men were killed. Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise will call from Liverpool for Canada about the 9th of November. The prolific harvest has had the effect of lowering the price of grain at Winnipeg. Wheat is quoted at 89 cts per bushel. There are now about 150 miles of drains under contract in Manitoba, which are being completed at the rate of about 3 miles daily. A meeting of the London Division Grange on Thursday discussed the question of market fees, and the general opinion seemed to be opposed to them. Eight thousand three hundred horses were exported from Montreal to the United States in the year ending June 30, 1880. Their value was \$670,000. The duty paid on entry into the United States was \$194,600. The Presbyterian congregation of Streetsville met on the evening of the 13th inst., and gave a unanimous call to Rev. Wm. McWilliam, M. A., of Bethesda and Alwick, with the promise of \$800 a year and a manse. It is learned that Frederick A. Vines, M. A., of Bell College, Oxford, has been appointed classical tutor and dean of residence of Toronto University. He has arrived in Canada and is on his way to fill the position. The cattle fair at Mount Forest last week was well attended and a good number of sales were effected at prices considerably in advance of those of last month. There was an excellent demand for steers for feeding purposes. An Indian named Silversmith was found about two o'clock yesterday morning, near Onondaga, in the Brant reserve, with his throat cut and evidence of a deadly struggle all around his body. Another Indian, who was seen in his company on Sunday night, has been arrested an inquest is being held. Canada has thirty paper mills, fifteen of which are in Ontario, fourteen in Quebec, and one is in New Brunswick. They are capable of producing fifty two tons every twenty four hours, and make, principally, wrapping, manilla, news, and book papers. One manufacturer, Messrs. Buntin & Co., at Montreal, has tried wrappings, and that to a small extent. American competition is too active for that. A young man named Jones, in trouble circumstances, living at Penitence, county of Prescott, Ont., has become the recipient of \$1,000,000. The amount was bequeathed to him by his father, who was a wholesale bookseller and stationer in London, and who died some years ago. Jones, it seems, ran away from home when he was young, and his whereabouts have been for some time unknown to his friends. He has been employed at Penitence quite, however, unknown to his relatives. A Family Free Fight.

GALESBURG, Ill., Sept. 20. -Last week particular were given of the elopement of Nellie Chase, a refined and educated young lady, daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Chase, of the Episcopal Church, with Samuel Moore, a colored coachman. They were married at the house of a negro named Payne, 10 miles from here, but the same day Moore was arrested on a charge of larceny, for carrying of a satchel of clothing belonging to the young lady. He was placed in jail, where he remained till Saturday, when he was released on \$2,000 bail. He has had no chance of seeing his wife since their marriage, as she was taken away to her relatives. Another startling turn of the affair occurred this morning at the depot here. Miss Chase, accompanied by her two brothers and her brother-in-law, the Rev. G. Higgins, were aboard the 7 o'clock train for Peoria, where the Hon. Horace Chase one of her brothers, resides. Miss Chase had scarcely seated herself in the car when, to the surprise of all, her colored lover and husband put in an appearance and insisted on seeing his wife. An altercation at once took place between him and the young lady's relatives, during which blows were exchanged and Horace Chase drew a revolver and fired at the retreating negro. The ball missed its mark and struck Mr. Geo. Crocker, a well known merchant, in the shoulder. His wound is not serious. This brought together a crowd, and a regular rough and tumble fight took place upon the platform, in which Moore, the Chase brothers, and policemen were participants. Moore escaped a harness, and Horace Chase was taken before the police court, and gave bonds for his appearance next Tuesday. Moore was discharged, no one appearing against him. Miss Chase and relatives went to Peoria on the next train. The excitement runs high, and it is difficult to say what course the affair may take. No one appears to know the sentiments of the young lady about the affair, but her friends declare that she was of her mind when she married the negro. Moore says he is bound to have his wife.
