Church Music.

To the Editor of the Grey Review,
Sir.—In your last issue "Verity" says
"There is no praise so acceptable in the sight of God as the silent adoration of the heart; none so earnest as the inward breathings of the soul; yet when the mind is overcharged with feelings of joy these feelings find vent in words and the soul bursts forth into song." I fully endorse the sentiments contained in this statement, and I would say "Verity" why he wishes the aid of instruments to assist the voice when he admits that the voice unaided is the most acceptable in the sight of God. Now in the case of the aid to the which "Verity" referred in his first letter, I would ask, is it customary to aid the eye to read God's Word when they are capable of doing so without aid? Certainly not. Assistance to the eyes when uncalled for is adopted by a certain class of people usually called swells. But Verity is no common innovator, as he also supports the introduction of dancing into the service of praise. In his first letter he said "The Anti-organists do not see where they are being led to." If it is a natural consequence that on becoming Pro-organists, they should become pre-dancers, they certainly would be changing, find where they were being led to. The Presbyterian Church of Canada admits that its members, when Anti-organists, may be orthodox; but the same cannot be said of the Pro-dancers. Verity then insinuates that I condone vocal music when denominational instrumental; but the insinuation is unfounded.

Instrumental music in the Mosaic dispensation is typical of the music of the heart and was not used in the New Testament Church, hence the reason for not adopting it now. Why Verity should leave Melanchton out of those I mentioned as Anti-organists, and put Luther in his place, I am at a loss to discover. But I accept of the three which he mentioned and on a future occasion, as space would not permit me at present, with your kind permission, Mr. Editor, I shall give proof for the statement. As Verity mentions no objections to my statement that Christ and his apostles together with the Christian fathers exhorted to sing praise; and that the numerous Presbyterian divines following after Knox, until lately, were Anti-organists, it is plain that he accepts this statement as correct. I now again ask Verity to withdraw his sneering statement as to those divines being ignorant. In the "Directory for the public worship of God" agreed upon by the Assembly of Divines at Westminster 1616 it reads, "It is the duty of Christians to praise God publicly, by singing of Psalms together in the congregation, and also privately in the family." The Anti-organists of this place thoroughly agree with this, but Verity offers his opinions on the matter, as he stated in his first letter, "hoping that they will, in some measure tend to a settlement of it." Now he (Verity) must think either that the Anti-organists here are very ignorant or that his arguments are very weighty. He has told us about the Psalmist exhorting to praise God with the sound of the trumpets; but the Psalmist also exhorts to sing praises to God. He also attempted to show that if it was right to assist the eyes with instruments, it was right to assist the voice in singing praise. I now ask Verity to prove in a systematic manner (giving authority in all cases for his statements) that the Anti-organists are wrong, instead of dealing out idle challenges and belittling expressions regarding the intelligence of others. If Verity will prove that instrumental music is right, he must come to the conclusion that the Anti-organists will become Pro-organists; for he admits that they are "conceited though ignorant, and from the liberal spirit displayed by Verity, I believe that he will become an Anti-organist on my proving that instrumental music is wrong.
