experience without taking a prize, but he always tried again. He believed in raising fields roots in the field and not raising a few choice field roots in the garden just for the show. He closed by giving some of his early family experiences.

Mr. Walker always felt an interest in agricultural shows. He had not seen better young horses, cattle and sheep than at this show.

Mr. Deans proposed the "President and Directors of the Froot Agricultural Society" in a neat address.

Duncan McMillan, Esq., Vice-President, said he came to this country in 1829, and had commenced to live a home in the bush three times. He was probably the oldest member present of any Agricultural Society. He helped to organize an agricultural society in Durham 26 years ago. He spoke in reference to the needed improvement in cattle.

Mr. Thos. Hanbury, President, was well pleased with the success of the show. He believed the show in the future would be second to none in the county.

Henry Graham, Esq., proposed the health of "The late President and Secretary of the Froot Agricultural Society."

Joseph McArdle, Esq., ex-Secretary, said he had always done the best for the Society he could. He approved of the remarks of Mr. McMillan.

Mr. Kinneil replied briefly.

John Abbott, Esq., proposed "The Press," coupled with the name of J. Townsend.

Mr. J. Townsend pointed out the necessity of improvement of buildings, stock, etc., and the marked improvement that was taking place in raising fruit and the extensive cattle trade that was now developing between this country and Great Britain.

Mr. J. J. Middleton proposed "The Lady Exhibitors at the Froot Show" coupled with the names of Dr. McWilliam and Geo. Hetherington, in a neat address in behalf of the Ladies.

Dr. McWilliam was pleased to be called to respond twice, but still felt a debility in replying.

Mr. George Butherford said he was surprised at the direction the meeting had taken, was pleased with some of the remarks made, and criticized some of them. He replied to the ruling out of Osprey, and spoke in favor of union with the neighboring townships.

Dr. McWilliam proposed "Educational Interests," coupled with the names of Messrs. Gowan, Patten and Black—replied to by those gentlemen.

Mr. Gowan replied briefly.

Mr. Malcolm Black thanked the assembly for the honor done him by calling upon him. Teachers had a great responsibility, as they had to train the coming generation. He closed with a comic recitation.

Mr. McMillan said no doubt education was good, and necessary, and spoke of the farming community forming themselves into societies and meeting weekly or fortnightly and discussing the best methods of farming, building, etc.

Mr. Middleton spoke of a cheese factory, and urged upon the farmers the establishment of one in that neighborhood.

Mr. John Rindell, of Melanethon, spoke of the necessity of having better buildings for feeding cattle. He also referred to the improvements in sheep, and gave some good reasons for the establishment of a cheese factory.

Mr. Samuel Stokes gave a Scotch song.

Mr. Whitty spoke in favor of a cheese factory, and gave his experience in the cheese business.

The President then presented Mr. Arch. Burnett, of Havelock, with a diploma as the best horse-churn-laying maker first-prize three years in succession.

Mr. Peter McGregor bore testimony to the good character of Mr. A. Burnett, having known him since he was a little boy. He would support the Society in the future as he had in the past.

Mr. J. J. Middleton proposed a toast to the "Host," Mr. S. McCullough, and his testimony to the universal esteem in which Mr. McCullough was held in the community, and also the liberality of the other hotel-keepers in the village.

The meeting closed with three cheers for the "Queen," and the guests separated, no doubt highly pleased with the pleasant and sensible character of the entertainment.

Mr. Berwick, of Shelburne, preached in the Orange hall last Sabbath on behalf of the Church of England.

The Rev. Mr. Potter, Methodist minister, preached an eloquent sermon to a full house. His discourses are very much appreciated by all the people of the vicinity.

Moved by Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. McMillan, That the notice furnished in the Markdale *Expositor* respecting a road on lots 99, 100 and 101 on 3rd con., W. T. S. R. be published in the *Markdale Standard*.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. McMillan, That the road Commissioner for ward No. 1 be authorized to build a railing on the bridge at lot 26, con. 3rd, E. G. R.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Binnie, seconded by Mr. McMillan, That a committee be appointed, consisting of the Reeve, Mr. McMillan, and the mover, to procure titles for the new road on lots 22 and 24, con. 11, and lots 99, 100 and 101, con. 3, W. T. S. R.—Carried.

Council adjourned to meet at the same place on 26th December next.
