Just Saved.

A PORT HOPE MAN NEARLY CREMATED. One of the narrowest escapes from a hor rible death that we have ever heard of took place the other day at Victoria Harbor, between Waubaushene and Midland. The large saw-mill belonging to Mr. Powers is situated there, and gives employment to a a large number of men. The saw-dust and mill-refuse is burned in a large kiln, made of boiler iron. The kiln is about eighty feet high, and has doors in the side. about forty feet from the ground. those the mill refuse is taken by an endless chain, which throws it into a large fire that is built in the bottom, and as a rule there is from twenty to thirty feet of solid flame. As a general thing there is two men whose duty it is to see that the carriers are not clogged, and to see that the refuse passes into the kiln all right. On the day in question, only one man, named Payne, a blacksmith by trade, is believed that this mine was set on fire looking after the work. He was in the mill and stepped into the carriers to ride up to his proper place at the door of the furnace. In places the ground has caved in, forming chasms a hundred feet deep. There is but a thin shell of earth over the pit of fire. At night, blue sulphurous flames issue from the crevices in the ground. It is dangerous to walk across the spot. Several persons have mysteriously disappeared in the vicinity during the past twenty years. It is believed that in a majority of the cases they have fallen into the burning mine. Dougharty, the oeiginal proprietor of the mine, attempted to go across once. He sank to his arm-pits through the crust, and was only saved by courageous friends who ventured to his assistance. The stones on the ground are hot, and snow never rests there. Rain turns to vapor as soon as it falls on the roof of the burning mine. Millions of dollars' worth of the best quality of coal have been consumed by the fire.
