The question has been asked :- "Has the cost of living increased since and in conse quence of the existing Canadian tariff ?"and the question will be answered in the affirmative by every householder in the land. It is sarely by this time well understood that . the N. P. has increased the price of every thing which enters into household useminus flour and potatoes-from ten to thirty per cent., and as a consequence the cost of living has been increased to that exteut. On this point we have the independent testimony of two witnesses, well competent to give evidence. A Paptist minis ter writing to the Globe, says that the N. P. has increased his household expenses to the extent of \$200 yearly, and a minister of the Methodist Church, Mr. Haddon, says that it has so impoverished him, that has nothing left wherewith to purchase books and periodicals, articles so necessary to the comfort of an intelligent person at the present day. In asking the question however, the attempt is furtively male to draw the inference, that admitting the increased cost of household goods, the N. P. has increased the profits of the producers, and therefore, that what is lost on the one once admit that some half-dozen cotton and fits increased by the N. P.
