The blue book containing the statistics of The return of passengers carried shows

an enormous increase of 61.43 per cent over the previous year, there being 10,868, 634 in 1880 against 6,523,816 in 1879. freight there was an increase of 18.17 per cent-9.638.858 tons against 8.328.810 tons. There was an increase in passenger traffic and Intercolonial. The freight increase was shown among all the lines, that of the Grand Trunk being the largest. The total increase in passengers and freight was \$3,-611,473.50. The average earnings per mile were \$3415, an increase of \$332. The op erating expenses were \$16,188,284.46, an increase of \$950,972.49. Thus while the earnings per mile in 1877-80 were greater by \$332, than in 1878-79, the operating expenses were\$60 per mile less. The net profit in 1879-80 was \$6,270,872.17 against \$3,736,783.81 in 1878-79-an increase of \$2,984,988.36.

There were 87 person killed during the year of whom only 10 were passengers. the proportion of the latter being only one in 1,053,231, so that the risk in railway travelling is apparently reduced to a mir

Fiendish Outrage Near St. Catharines.

ST. CATHARINES, May 26 .- Within the

past few days particulars of an outrage

committed on a young orphan girl named Sarah Jane Porter, have come to light which discloses a case of almost unparalled brutality. The details of the affair are substantially as follows :- The girl who had for some time been in the service of Mr. tlemans place about two months ago, and went to reside with Dr. Thrall, of the same place. About three weeks afterwards Dr. Thrall sent the girl on to Merritton by train, it was believed, to the home of her uncle. Notable Earthquakes.

The most disastrous earthquakes these in Italy (526) when 120,000 persons perished, and of Sicily (1598) when 60,000 lost their lives. According to Gibbon. toward 542 each year was marked with the repetition of earthquakes of such duration that Constantinople was shaken above 40 days - of such extent that the shock was communicated to the whole surface of the empire. This period of earthquake and plague (642) was the period when the superior planets were in perihelion, as they are now. Arabian and Persian chronicles and eighteenth centuries, some lasting from forty to seventy days, rose nearly all accompanied by wind and floods, or terrible storms of lightning and thunder. Readers of the Relations des Jesuites will remember the great earthquakes of 1668, which shook and tossed the earth for six months from Gaspe to Montreal, the rival of our earthquake of 1782 in the Mississippi Valley. -Chicago News.
