S. Grey Teacher's Association.

Fleisherton, 19th May, 1881. The teachers of South Grey Inspectorate held their spring Convention at Fleisherton on the 19th and 20th May in accordance with a resolution passed at a former meeting.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

It affords me much pleasure to greet you on the occasion of another annual meeting of the South Grey Teacher's Association, and my congratulations are the more happy from the fact, that so far as I am aware, the death rate has not included any of our number.

2. Without fatiguing you with any dry detail of figures, I would briefly state that the past year, educationally, has been one of progress in several respects.

3. Since our last semi-annual meeting Melancthon, the eldest township of our School District, (including the incorporated and progressive village of Shelburne), has become detached from us, and now forms an important part of the County of Dufferin.

4. It might possibly expedite the business of the Association, were a committee appointed, by ballot or otherwise, to nominate several committees to whom the matters of Finance, audit, management, library, delegation, question drawer, nomination and election officers, promotion examinations, visitors and guests, recent or prospective legislation, superannuation, etc., might be submitted for report to the Association, if necessary.

5. With reference to the change made in the time of collecting the half-yearly subscriptions to the Superannuation fund, I trust that after the very little friction incident to change wears off, the scheme will commend itself as a permanent cure for the oft recurring annoyance to trustees and teachers to which the other system was subject.

6. I am informed that the books borrowed from the association Library, have been very generally duly returned, with the exception of two volumes, which are now more than a year out, and for which your Librarian has by letter several times unsuccessfully applied.

7. Through the courtesy of Messrs. Gage & Co., of Toronto, I have received for distribution, a number of copies of the April No. of the Canada School Journal, containing the proposed Bill for a Provident or Superannuation Fund; a perusal of which may assist in forming an intelligent opinion on the matter.

8. In conclusion, hoping that the present meeting may be a complete success—that each will take an active interest in securing the same,—desiring in return both profit and pleasure,—apologizing for my lack of administrative ability—and hoping that you will this time put the right man in the right place to second me.

By motion duly seconded and carried the duty of naming a committee for nominating office bearers and standing Committees for ensuing year was laid on the Secretary who named the following gentlemen:—Messrs. Armstrong, Galbraith, McMaster, Jones and McDonald.

After reading communications, Mr. Armstrong was first called on to take up his subject. After explaining that he deemed it advisable to change the title of the subject set against his name on the Programme he read an exceedingly instructive and interesting paper on "Method."

The next subject on the programme was taken up by Mr. Galbraith viz., "Geometry for Beginners." Mr. Galbraith very fully and clearly illustrated his method of teaching the subject and in a discussion that arose it was agreed by all that the methods indicated were far more reasonable and useful than the memorizing system still adopted by too many teachers.

Mr. Jones then took up his subject "Teachers Encouragements and Discouragements" and treated it in his usual hearty and effective manner urging among other incentives to the members of the profession that the conscientious teacher was the great civilization—indeed the greatest.

After routine business meeting adjourned at 12:15.
