Whole Townships swept by the Flames. FEARFUL LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.

Minden, via Port Sanilac, Mich., Sept. 7.—A terrible fire has been raging west of Minden since Monday noon, and at times it has been as dark as night in Minden region.

Port Huron, Mich., Sept. 7.—It is thought here that the destruction of life and property in Sanilac and Huron Counties by fire this week will greatly exceed the estimation that 100 lives were lost on Monday.

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At Sand Beach 100 lives will not begin to cover the loss. The dead are scattered all through the peninsula, and those who still live are separated from help by miles of burning trunks and heated ash-fields.

A trip through the burned district showed in many instances men, women and children lying on their faces in the road just where they had fallen when overtaken by the fire, the children lying on legs where they had clambered for safety.

Forest township turned out to-day to bury dead horses, cattle and sheep, the stench being unbearable. The Rev. W. F. Allington found 10 dead bodies near Deckerlyville.

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Bentick Council. The fourth session of the Bentick Council for the present year was held at Chittick's Hotel, Allan Park, on Monday 20th August—members all present. By-law laying the following rates for the current year was passed, viz., 3 mills in dollar for County rate and school equivalent, 6 mills for interest and sinking fund on by-law No. 3, for 1877, 6 mills on an assessment of \$200,000 to meet the interest and sinking fund on by-law No. 4 for 1878, 8 mills on an assessment of \$200,000 to meet interest and sinking fund on by-law No. 5 for 1879 and 24 mills on an assessment of \$200,000 to meet interest and sinking fund on by-law No. 7 for 1879. By-law laying the necessary school rates was also passed. Moved by Mr. Messenger, seconded by Mr. McCallum, That D. McDonald be re-appointed collector at the same salary as last year, viz. \$125.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Messenger, that the application of the Trustees of S. S. No. 18 to the Council to raise by the issue of debentures the sum of \$300, be received and that a by-law be prepared and passed as the next session, Council authorizing the same.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Messenger, that it be an instruction to the County Treasurer to withdraw from sale and erase arrears of taxes against lot 12, con. 1, N. D. E., said arrears having been charged in error.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Messenger, that the account of James Lynn for scraper sold to this corporation, amounting to \$6 be paid and that a cheque do now issue.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Willis, seconded by Mr. Messenger, that the sum of \$20 be granted to the Bentick Agricultural society for the current year.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Messenger, that the petition of George Cuff and 22 others asking aid for Louis Ramble be received and that \$12 be granted by the Council to assist him to go to the General Hospital at Toronto.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Messenger, that the Reeve and mover be a committee to examine deviation in 10th con. at lots 21 and 22, and if possible arrange with the parties owning these lots for a change of land from the present road allowance to the foot of the hill.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Willis, that Walter Laidlaw be allowed the sum of \$4 for repairing plow broken while performing station labour, and that a cheque do now issue.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Messenger, that the petition of John Black and 81 others requesting the Council to improve side line No. 5 be received. That any improvement put on said road extend from the 2nd to the 12th concessions, that the sum of \$200 be expended this Fall in the covering of crossways and cutting fills and that the Reeve attend to the expenditure of the same.—Carried. The Reeve reported that he had jointly with the Reeve of Glenora, expended \$28 in repairs to the Rocky Sangeen Bridge, to pay one half. Mr. Dickson reported having expended his appropriation in the improvement of roads in various parts of his division. Mr. Messenger reported having expended \$60 for \$71.85 of his appropriation; Mr. McCallum \$62.25 to his; and Mr. Willis \$80.50 of his. Reports ordered to be received. Council to meet at call of the Reeve. Egremont Council. The Egremont Township Council met at Holstein on Monday, August 6th. Members all present. Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. A petition from Alex. McIntyre and 15 others was presented for aid to Miss East. Moved by Mr. Lawrence, seconded by Mr. Paul, That Miss East receive \$50 of four per month from the 1st of July last.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Allen, seconded by Mr. McCormack, That James Mark be paid \$1.76 for travel for use of roads.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Lawrence, seconded by Mr. McCormack, That Mr. Paul's report on McAlpine and McLaughlin's bridges be adopted.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Paul, seconded by Mr. McCormack, That W. J. Pettit be allowed 8 days statute labour for next year for covering part of bridge and fixing approaches to the same opposite the grist mill in Holstein.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Paul, seconded by Mr. Lawrence, That the Holstein bridge be repaired the Reeve to inspect the same and to be charged to the South-West Ward.—Carried. Mr. Paul presented his report respecting bridge at Lot 17, con. 5 and 6. Resolved that it lie over for further consideration. Resolved that the members of Council receive \$4 each for two days at Council.—\$20.00. The Reeve reported that the boy James Barton was appointed to Richard Walker on the 11th of June last when both James and William Barton were handed over to R. Walker; the boy William to be kept for the present at the rate of \$4 per month and recommending that the by-law authorizing the same agreement be not passed until next meeting as there is a prospect of getting William apprenticed also. Moved by Mr. McCormack, seconded by Mr. Lawrence, That Mrs. Richard Walker be paid \$8 for two months board for the boy William Barton.—Carried. Resolved that pathmasters send in their Return without delay and that Trustees send in the amount to be levied on the school sections at once. Resolved that this Council adjourn and meet again at Holstein, on Monday 27th of October next, at 10 a. m., to levy the rate, and appoint Collectors and other business. Council adjourned. R. Lawrence, Clerk. It is reported that a service from Holstein was called for by the lack in the Central Prison, Toronto.
