

Two Lake Vessels Wrecked.

On Saturday night it will be recalled that a violent storm came on about ten o'clock. It appears the storm was very severe on the Lakes, causing a great destruction of property. The steamer Columbia, of the North East Line, has foundered, and 15 out of 22 people have been lost.

The schooner Regina, of Owen Sound, foundered off Cove Island on Saturday night and was lost with her crew of five. The following despatches from Collingwood and Owen Sound, show how the terrible news were received in these places: Collingwood, Sept. 12.—As soon as the Montreal Telegraph office was opened this morning the terrible news was received from Frankfort Mich., dated Sept. 11th, to the effect that the steamer Columbia, owned by Capt. J. B. Fairgrieve, of Hamilton, had been lost, and that three of the bodies, those of Captain Malcomson, W. Crosley, First Engineer, and Wm. Maphan, Second Engineer, had been washed ashore. The news of this sad affair spread like wildfire, and before many minutes had elapsed the Montreal Telegraph office was besieged by anxious friends watching every movement of the operator, and pleading to him most piteously to hurry the news. An unfortunate woman, whose husband was on the ill-fated steamer, on hearing the news and seeing no mention of her husband's name among those saved, rushed for the lake and jumped into the water, determined to follow the fate of her husband. By the strenuous efforts of those at hand, she was rescued. The sight that followed at one o'clock, when a full report was received, was most pitiful and heartrending. Men, women and children, who had gathered around the telegraph office eagerly waiting the news, fell back and burst into tears on hearing the names of their dearly loved ones read among the saved. The wailing and moaning of heart-broken women was something that will long be remembered by those who heard it. The report received from Frankfort says that fifteen persons found a watery grave, while the following were saved:—John Moor, James Wright, Daniel McPhee, James Makie, John Fagan, Thomas Lee, and Frank Harranon. The names of those drowned are not all known. Captain Malcomson, and his son, who was first mate of the Columbia, hail from Hamilton, Ont., and the majority of the rest of the crew are citizens of Collingwood. Wm. Crosley, First Engineer, was a highly respected citizen, and a member of the Maritime Order here, who leaves a wife and one small child. Second Engineer Maphan, is also from this town, and he likewise leaves a wife and seven children. As far as can be ascertained the Columbia foundered on Saturday at 11 p. m., off Frankfort Mich., North 240 miles of Chicago. The steamer was considered perfectly sea-worthy and classed as an All boat.
