

Koumiss.
The koumiss which the President likes so well and uses so much of is supplied by a druggist in Philadelphia. It is frequently prescribed now by physicians, and is readily prepared. The Russian original was of mare's milk, which contains more sugar than cow's milk. To make it of cow's milk, ordinary bear bottles with patent stoppers are filled with fresh milk, and into each, one teaspoonful of sugar and another of yeast is put. They are then stopped and left in summer heat. In a day or two a curd will rise filling half the bottle, but at a subsequent stage the whey and the curd coalesce again, and the mixture assumes the appearance of a weak of ordinary milk charged with carbonic acid. It is then to be drunk, after cooling. When the bottles are opened, the contents are the most furious of all carbonated water, and it will be hardly able to attempt it in the White House, if it contains any works of art. The bottles must be turned, neck downwards into a big pitcher, the top covered tightly with a napkin, and then the stopper loosened by pressing the wire hand into the pitcher. Otherwise it will be all over the clothing, wall paper, ceiling, and other objects of interest. The drink itself is a palatable acid, covered with a fine froth like a beaten egg. It is a kind of champagne milk, and is very favorable to persons who need an acid but nutritious beverage.

The party who stole them sold them at a good price at the Orangeville Fair, and they eventually fell into the hands of a Toronto exporter. As the cost of recovering them would amount to more than they are worth, the Messrs. Tindall gave them up for lost.

A Murderous Plot.
St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 1.—The conspiracy among the convicts incarcerated on the French island of St. Pierre, at the entrance to Fortune Bay, was most formidable in its conception, and had it been carried out would have been tantamount to the destruction not only of the Governor and military authorities, but also of all the inhabitants of the island. The permanent population of this French penal colony is 5,500 persons, to which may be added during the summer season an additional two thousand five hundred fishermen. The place is a French naval station, is strongly fortified, and is garrisoned by gendarmes. The convicts, who are men of the most incorrigible sort, lately resolved to make one desperate bid for freedom. Their programme was one of wholesale assassination. The Governor, the Chief Justice, the gendarmes, the custodians of the armory and the military hospitals, were all to be dispatched. The city was to be fired in several places simultaneously by carefully laid trains, and the water pipes severed at their connections. This would have involved the destruction of nearly all the inhabitants, as they all live huddled together in buildings close one upon another. Two sailing vessels were to receive the convicts, who by some means had succeeded in "muddling" the Sergeant-Major in charge of the armory, obtaining casts of his keys, and multiplying them without being detected. Owing to the mistaken leniency of the Governor, discipline had become somewhat relaxed, for though one man had been sentenced to death from insubordination, others of the convicts who were equally to blame were allowed to enjoy the same comparative liberty as their fellows, which included leave in the case of all who had good prison records to go about the city as they pleased during certain hours of the day. Hence they had ample time for arranging the details of their plot. Their first idea was simply the release of the man under sentence of death. This, however, rapidly developed itself into the much wider and wilder scheme of liberating the whole convict gang and of escaping altogether from the island. A few days sufficed to mature their plans. One lot of fellows picked out the vessels of which they were to secure possession in the confusion consequent on the burning of and tumult in the city. Another batch had charge of the provisions and outfitting of the ships by wholesale robbery. To another circle was entrusted the task of sacking the armory and possessing themselves of the weapons therein. The worst desperadoes undertook the murder of the Government officials, in which they were to be aided by two of the custodians of the military hospitals whom they had won over to their side. The signal was to be given at eleven o'clock at night, after the drums had ceased beating and all was at rest. The diabolical plot, however, was nipped in the bud, but only just in time, as up to three o'clock in the afternoon of the very day fixed upon for the carrying out of their nefarious designs not a whisper had reached the ears of the authorities. At that hour the two hospital custodians happened to be discussing the plot and the chances of success in a ward close to a room where an invalid soldier was lying resting after his walk on the *glacis* where they supposed him to be. He made no sign, but after eagerly drinking in all the details, made them known to the chief physician, who in accordance with his usual custom, made his rounds soon after. The Doctor at once gave notice and the Governor immediately ordered out the full force of gendarmes, who swooped down on the dumfounded conspirators. For a moment they were at a loss what to do, but at last, like wild beasts at bay, they turned upon their captors and fought them desperately. A large number, however, had been arrested and thrown into chains. The others, after seeing several of their comrades shot down or bayoneted, where panic-stricken and overpowered. The capture of the gang told off to seize on the vessels was followed close upon that of the others. The last, however, was nearly successful in getting clear off to sea. Hearing the uproar they guessed what had taken place, and were trying to embark in boats, when the gendarmes cut them off. The conspirators were at once tried. Twenty were sentenced to be shot at once, and all the ring-leaders are sure of a similar fate. The prompitude with which the conspiracy was crushed, and the energetic measures taken to ensure the due punishment of the conspirators, has produced a wholesome effect on the rest of the convicts who will find that their future will not be made so easy for them.
