The Extinction of the Oyster

Lient. Francis Winslow, of the Unite States coast survey, was an article in Popular Science Monthly for November which is calculate to make pale the check of the restaurant-keeper and cause ahara in the stomach, if not the beart of every American lover of the oyster. Lieut. Will slow writes of the deterioration of our oyster-beds with significently warning statisties drawn from foreign sources His conclusions are also strengthened careful experiments made in connecti n with two of the most prolific oyster le's of the north have already become practically exhausted, and while some authorities are disposed to consider the beds of Mary. land and Virginia inexhaustable, Lieut. Winslow does not. His tests showed most conclusively that the present method of working the beds is exceedingly wasteful and exhaustive. A clumsy dredge in the shape of a scoop, weighing from five t thirty tons is dragged back and forth, wrenching the bivalves from their resting places, crushing many of them, forcing others hp downward into uncongenial mu and generally much impairing reproductive power. This dredging is merciless and well-nigh continuous, notwithstanding protective laws. The oysterman is like the lumberman. So long as he supplies the present generation at a profit to himself the tuture is of small concern to him. Lieut Winslow gives some striking instances of the disastrous results of overdoing oyster beds off the coast of France and England From the beds of the Cancall bay, on the north-west of France, 70,000,000 oysters were taken in 1848. From 1859 to 1868, Glazing, Graining, and Paper Hanging the decrease was from 15,000,000 oysters taken in the former year to a few over 1. Fresco and Banner Painting a 000,000 in the latter. 


