

CANADIAN ITEMS.

Daniel Striker, a farmer living on the 6th con. of Wallace, about two miles from Palmerston, was killed by a falling tree. He lived only two hours after the accident.

The West Lynne Times says:—A man named Julius Kojah, late of Odessa, Ont., was found dead last Sunday about 500 yards from his residence, close to the boundary line, at Ernestown, near St. Joe, in Dakota. It appears that he had been drinking in one of the Mennonite villages near the line, and was last seen in company with two Mennonites.

Some years ago, says the Champion, several domestic animals belonging to Mr. Miller, of Norval, were attacked with a mysterious disease, which carried them off in a few days, they being buried on the farm. A short time ago some pigs which had been feeding in the neighbourhood of the grave were taken with a disease which manifested itself the same symptoms, and also killed them in a few days. Mr. Miller determined to examine the animals, and if possible determine what the ailment was, and cut them open for the purpose. It is supposed that during the dissection the virus entered a small cut on his hand, for it immediately became swollen, the inflammation spreading to his body, and causing his death in a very short time.

The situation at Ash postoffice (Zimmerman Station) demands the immediate attention of the Postmaster-General. In this neighbourhood is a large number of villagers and farmers, who have asked for and been promised the advantages of a postoffice. All the necessary paraphernalia of such an institution have been provided in accordance with the instructions of the head of the Department, and a man has been placed in charge and duly installed as postmaster. Unfortunately this person has not the confidence of the people. Although he has officiated since June only some half dozen of the neighbouring residents have consented to receive and despatch their papers and letters through Ash postoffice. It is even alleged that for these few have to put up with annoyances that would not be tolerated in any other locality. Representations made to the number for Hinton, both by public meeting and petition, remain unnoticed; therefore another petition is now in circulation setting forth objections to the Government appointee, which will bear the names of nearly every resident in the vicinity, and this petition will be despatched to the Postmaster-General direct. If a community is entitled to postal privileges it is a shame that they should be debarred from availing themselves of those privileges when provided by the presence of an obnoxious person, whose only claim to the position is his political faith. The fact that a proportion of the signatures attached to the petition now circulating are those of Conservatives is sufficient evidence that the trouble is no party quarrel, but a popular demand for guaranteed security and straight dealing in their postoffice affairs. And what they demand ought to be granted and promptly.—Globe.
