FARMER SHOT DEAD AND HIS RESIDENCE

Shelburne, Jan. 22nd. Smith a quat and inoffensive citizen of the township of Amaranta, residing about 4 miles from the village of Shelbourne WILLIAMS-ROBERTSON-At Durham, on the 19th was fouly newdered in his own house inst., by the Rev. Wm. Parke, Mr. Albert Williams, Egrement, to Miss Sarah Robertson of about six o'clock last night. The un-fortunate victim was a bachelor about or over fifty years of age, and usually lived alone; but it happened that when the murder was committed a nephew named Johnny Smith, about fourteen years of age, was with him

The boy's story is that his uncle and him self, after taking supper together, seated themselves by an open tireplace, and shortly after he heard a report either of a gun or pistol, and the old man fell. He looked towards the window from whence the report came and saw a tall man with a dark mous tache. The boy immediately started for the door, which was opposite the window, when the man fired at him, the ball passing through the top of his cap. He ran for dear life towards a neighbor's house, which is quiet a distance. After he had run a short distance He alarmed the neighbors as soon as possible, and returned with them to the burning building, and found the old man at the door dead, and one leg burned off below the knee. The old man was reputed to have been quite wealthy, and to have kept a large sum hidden about the house. It is not known whether he had any at this time or not. There is no elue to the assassin except what can by glean ed from the boy's story.


