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Facts and Figures About Newspapers.

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Youthful Burglars in Mount Forest.

The great event last week was the arrest of three boys, named Blakely, Lambert and Little, who burglarized O'Brien's office, A. Lamont's store, and Knox's Jewelry store on Sunday.

After a night's lodging in the lock-up the boys appeared before Justices Hampton and Coleleigh to answer a charge made by Mr. O'Brien against them.

At first the boys stoutly denied robbing Lamont's store; but during the afternoon several articles that had been found where secreted by the boys were brought into court, when Little wailed and confessed.

The hardened young burglars told how they entered the different places as coolly as if they had been relating a lark to some comrades. "We went in to see what we could see, and when we saw things of value we put 'em into our pockets, that was all."

At the conclusion of the case the court gave Little and Blakely 60 days each, and Lambert 30 days in the county gaol, and on Wednesday Mr. Godfrey conveyed them to their new boarding house in Guelph.

Little (the name he is best known by—Douglas is his proper name) is only 18 years of age. The other two are probably a year or two older.

It was the general impression that the sentence was too light, but as the crime came under the "Juvenile Offenders Act," the justices could not very well have done otherwise, unless by committing them for trial, which would necessitate the attendance of all concerned at the Assizes.—Advertiser.

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
