

**The Gerrymandering Bill as Amended.**

The Gerrymandering Bill as printed and distributed differs materially from the measure as introduced. Most of the changes thus illegitimately made have already been telegraphed from Ottawa, but it is well to repeat them so that the country may know exactly in what shape it is being vivisected. We give entire each paragraph relating to any county the composition of which differs from that which was given in Saturday's issue:—

The county of Lincoln and Niagara shall consist of the town and township of Niagara, the town of St. Catharines, the townships of Grantham, Clinton, and Louth, and the villages of Beauséjour, Merriton and Port Dalhousie.

The change consists of the restoration of Clinton and Beauséjour.

The electoral district of Monck shall consist of the townships of Gainsboro, Moulton, Wainfleet, Canboro, Pelham, Dunn, and South Cayuga, and the villages of Dunnville and Sherbrooke.

South Cayuga is here substituted for Clinton, which appeared in the Bill as introduced.

The South Riding of Wentworth shall consist of the townships of Saltfleet, Brookville, Barton, Glanville, Grimsby, and Caistor, and the village of Grimsby.

As introduced the Bill included Beauséjour.

The county of Halton shall consist of the townships of Erin, Trafalgar, Nassagaweya and Esguise, the towns of Oakville and Milton, and the villages of Acton and Georgetown.

Halton was not given at all in the original Bill. Nelson and Burlington have been taken away from the county and Erin added. This was subsequently changed and Erin put back into Wellington.

The North Riding of the county of Wellington shall consist of the townships of Wallace, Minto, Arthur, Lether East, Lether West, and Amaranth, the whole of the town of Palmerston, part of which is now in another electoral district, and the villages of Arthur, and the towns of Clifford, Harrison, and Mount Forest.

Since the Bill was introduced the Government have thought proper to take away Maryborough and Shelburne and to add Wallace to this constituency.

The South Riding of the county of Grey shall consist of the townships of Benlueck, Normanby, Glenelg, Egremont, and Arden, and the town of Durham.

Arden has been added within the last few days.

The East Riding of the county of Grey shall consist of the townships of Collingwood, Euphrasia, Oprey, Melancthon, Proton, and St. Vincent, the village of Shelburne, and the town of Meaford.

Shelburne is the latest addition here.

The South Riding of the county of Perth shall consist of the townships of Blanchard, Hibbert, Downie, Fullerton, and Osborne, and the towns of St. Mary's and Mitchell.

Osborne has been restored since the Bill was introduced.

The North Riding of the county of Perth shall consist of the townships of Ellice, Elma, Mornington, and Logan, and the town of Stratford and Listowel.

Logan has been substituted for Wallace.

The electoral district of Bothwell shall consist of the townships of Somers, Dawn, Camden, Chatham, and Zone, and the villages of Bothwell, Wallaceburg, Dresden, and Thamesville.

Chatham is added—a Conservative township put on for the express purpose of giving the Government of the Province of the Hon. David Mills.

The West Riding of the county of Lambton shall consist of the townships of Sarnia, Moore, and Plympton, and the villages of Wyoming, Forest, and Point Edward.

The East Riding of the county of Lambton shall consist of the townships of Ennisville, Brooke, Warwick, and Bosanquet, and the villages of Petrolia, Oil Springs, Alvinston, Watford, Arkona, and Theford.

The change in these two is in the transference of Petrolia to East Lambton, where it belongs geographically.

The new riding of Middlesex formed of Westminster, Delaware, Carleton, and Lobo, is to be called "South Middlesex" not "Centre Middlesex," as reported.

The Centre Riding of the county of Huron shall consist of the townships of Tuskersmith, Hullett, McKillop, and Grey, the village of Seaford, and the whole of the village of Brussels.

Seaford has been spirited away and a part of Brussels added.

North Huron is altered to correspond with the transference of the part of Brussels to Centre Huron.

**Inebriety as a Disease.**

Under this title a communication appears in the Detroit Medical Review, from the pen of Dr. Crothers, of Hartford, Conn. He points out that inebriety was recognized as a disease long before insanity was thought to be other than a spiritual madness—or a possession of the devil. This disease was hinted at in an early age of the world, and is by no means a modern idea. On an old papyrus found in one of the tombs of Egypt, dating back to a very ancient period, was a very significant passage relating to an inebriate who had failed to keep sober. Many of the sculptures of Thebes and Memphis exhibit inebriates in the act of receiving physical treatment from their slaves, such as purgatives, rubbings, or applications to the head and spine. Herodotus, five centuries before the Christian era, wrote "that drunkenness showed that both the body and soul were sick." Plutarch and Ptolemy assert "that drink madness is an affection of the body which may be cured by medicine." Many of the Greek philosophers recognized the physical character of inebriety and the hereditary influence of "follies" which were transmitted to the next generation. Laws were enacted forbidding women to use wine, and young boys were

restricted. In the first century of the Christian era St. John Chrysostom, urged that inebriety was a disease like dyspepsia, and illustrated his meaning by many distinctive recognitions of the disease which had been hinted at long before. In the next century A.D., the Roman jurist, referred to the irresponsible character of inebriates, and the necessity of treating them as sick men. Many of the early and later writers of Roman civilization contain references to drunkenness as a bodily disorder, not controllable beyond a certain point, which resulted in veritable madness. Little reference was made to this theory until the thirteenth century, when one of the Kings of Spain enacted laws fully recognizing inebriety as a disease, lessening the punishment of crime committed when under the influence of spirits. In the sixteenth century the penal codes of France and many of the German States contained enactments which recognized the disease character of inebriety. All punishment for crime committed during this state varied according to the condition of the prisoner at the time. In 1747 Condillac, a French philosopher, wrote expressing clear views of the disease of inebriety, also that the State should recognize and provide means for its treatment. He asserted that the impulse to drink was, like insanity, an affection of the brain which could not be reached by law or religion. Dr. Benjamin Rush, of Philadelphia, in 1796, set forth the same theory, supported by a long train of reasoning. To him belongs the honor of first elaborating this subject and outlining what has been accepted half a century after.—London Free Press.
