The timber alone is estimated to be worth \$125,000,000 and is capable of yielding sufficient revenue to govern this Province for many years to come. The contract made with the Pacific Railway Syndicate establishes in the Northwest a monopoly, which has no parallel on the continent of America. By this con tract, a system is inaugurated similar in

many respects to that which has disturbed the peace, marred the happiness and blighted the prosperity of Ireland for many generations past.
